



Some DAR 101's for Chapter Minutes


- The DAR Headquarters complex occupies an entire city block near the White House and includes three interconnected buildings with a combined space of 450,000 square feet. Two of the buildings, Memorial Continental Hall (built 1905-1910) and Constitution Hall (built 1929), are Registered National Historic Landmarks
- With a seating capacity of 3,702, DAR Constitution Hall is the largest concert hall in Washington, D.C. Built to hold the annual DAR Continental Congress, Constitution Hall also serves as a public venue when not being used for DAR purposes.
- Since its founding in 1896, the DAR Library has grown into a specialized collection of American genealogical and historical manuscripts and publications, as well as powerful on-site databases. The DAR Library collection contains more than 225,000 books, 10,000 research files, digitized collections of thousands of manuscript items, and special collections on African American, Native American, and women's history, genealogy, and culture. Nearly 30,000 family histories and genealogies comprise a major portion of the book collection, many of which are unique or available in only a few libraries in the country.

- The Administration Building, which connects the other two buildings, houses most of the working offices for the NSDAR staff and Executive Officers. There are more than 150 employees working at DAR Headquarters who perform the day-to-day operations of the National Society
- Founded in 1890 as a repository for family treasures, the DAR Museum has grown into one of the foremost collections of American decorative arts made or used before the Industrial Revolution. Accredited by the American Association of Museums, the collection features more than 30,000 objects.
- The Americana Collection contains approximately 4,000 manuscripts and rare imprints pertaining to Colonial America, the Revolutionary War period, and the Early Republic. This treasury includes items such as letters, diaries, birth and marriage records, military papers, autographs, drawings, and more. Among the holdings is a complete collection of original signatures of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence and the Framers of the United States Constitution.
