



- 5. Only registered Delegates and other voting members of the State conference shall be entitled to make motions, debate, and vote. State Committee Chairmen and District Directors who are not elected Delegates shall have the privilege to speak without vote.
- 6. All main motions shall be written and signed by the maker and seconder and sent to the Recording Secretary before action is taken. The maker of the motion shall rise and state her name and that of her chapter.
- 7. All resolutions shall have been in the hands of the Resolutions Committee before the State Conference. The date shall have been determined and announced by the Resolutions Committee Chairman.
- 8. No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes any time, except by the consent of the assembly.
- Members who appear on the program or who are making reports shall occupy the front seats. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business meetings.
- 10. Only the chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 11. Two timekeepers shall be appointed by the chair. Reports of State Officers shall be limited to four minutes, and reports of Committee Chairmen, District Directors and Chapter Regents to two minutes. The speakers shall conform with the ruling of the timekeepers.
- 12. Announcements must have the approval of the State Regent.
- 13. A copy of every report for the printed Proceedings of the State Conference shall be submitted, ready for printing, and sent to the State Recording Secretary before the report is read at the Conference.
- 14. If the Officer, Chapter Regent or Chapter Vice Regent, Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall not be read and shall be filed for printing in the official Proceedings of the State Conference unless otherwise ordered.
- 15. Any Chairman or individual having a table display or exhibit shall attend to the removal of all material at the close of the Conference.
- 16. All necessary communications shall be delivered by the Pages.
- 17. Members shall have cell phones turned off or on vibrating ringer during business sessions, meals, and programs.
- 18. Members shall smoke only in designated areas.
- 19. Registration shall close at 12:00 a.m., Saturday, March 12, 2005.
- 20. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised" will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

Ruth Clark joined DAR in 1982, as a member of the Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapter in Leavenworth, Kansas. She would hold many chapter offices and chairmanships. The need to select suitable facilities for three state conferences and three state workshops; many theme ideas to filter to find the appropriate selection; plus looking for a DAR state project. Chairman selection was a great project - fitting interests to the job. This officer emphasized appointing positions throughout the four districts of the state. Compilation of percentages of membership in each district brought a plan very close to the needs of equality. The desire to achieve the best of equality, competency, interest and new workers were this State Regent's goals. She was impressed by the willingness of members to accept state positions with the desire to serve the State Society, and for this, your State Regent is deeply appreciative.

July found this State Regent attending Continental Congress and its activities and meetings. In addition there was the fabulous Golden West Tea hosted by Kansas Daughters; the rededication of the Kansas Chapel in its new location that makes it more accessible to the public. However, the installation as State Regent on the stage of Constitution Hall had to be a "once in a lifetime" experience especially with five family members and eight hometown chapter Daughters in attendance. The oath of office was assumed by this officer with humility and determination to represent Kansas with honor. The reality of the girth of the job became apparent upon attending the first National Board meeting to hear the new Wagoner Administration's plans and dreams.

On July 31, 2004, it was delightful to welcome the Executive Committee and Kansas Daughters to Liberal, in western Kansas. The day's highlight was a bountiful luncheon and an afternoon reception hosted by your State Regent's chapter, Cimarron River Valley. Mrs. Judy Adams, Regent, and all of the members were gracious hosts to the State Officers and invited guests.

September found your State Regent attending the Veteran's Cemetery dedication as a distinguished guest in WaKeeney, several individuals stopped me and chatted about DAR and recognized the emblem of our society. The cemetery has a beautiful location and there was an impressive ceremony held for the affair and much interest in the requirements of securing plots.

The Board of Management/Workshop/District meeting site near Salina was a central location in the state for ease of attendance for the membership. The event was held at the Rolling Hills Conference Center and Zoo - a new facility and a "mecca spot". The program used a new format for reports planned by Shirley Coupal, State Vice Regent, and her committee. A survey of information was taken and compiled to lend direction to your board.

October 2004 was a big month for your State Regent. The first National October Board of Management was attended in Washington, D.C. There were meetings, a National Board luncheon, and a National State Regent's dinner at the City Tavern, a private club in Georgetown's historic district, which is known as the first hotel in Georgetown and houses the suite used by President John Adams. There was the opening night of the "Home and Country American Quilts and Samplers" show in the DAR Museum, a delightful event. This officer was distressed to find officially the Betty Bonney Chapter was disbanded, but happily to find the issue of Shawnee Mission Chapter's address change had been accomplished.

Following this meeting, this State Regent was privileged to board one of the two buses with 75 other Daughters from the entire society for a nine day trip touring DAR schools in the Appalachian area. The 2000-mile DAR National Bus Tour took us through seven states and to five of our DAR supported schools in the south: Kate Duncan Smith in Alabama, Berry College in Georgia, Tamassee DAR School in Kentucky, Crossnore School in North Carolina, and Hindman School in Kentucky. This officer learned more about the schools and the difference DAR makes in the lives of the children in the area and was proud to represent the Kansas State Society. It was also rewarding to become better acquainted with other State Regents and hear about DAR in their states.

November found your State Regent in Dodge City meeting the State Historian and the State Librarian and the Dodge City Chapter Regent to perform the inventory of the KSDAR Archives, which have been located in the KSDAR Library since 1995.

The next morning, your State Regent and Historian traveled west to Scott State Park, near Scott City to meet representatives from the Kansas Historical Society and the Kansas State Wildlife and Park Service to survey and discuss the needs and potential plans and dreams for the El Cuartelejo Indian pueblo on the acreage owned by the Kansas Society located within the park that was leased some years ago. Discussion soon pinpointed the need for an official survey, new contracts, reclamation needs and the wish of KSDAR to have input in future plans and to have recognition of ownership. This is YOUR State Regent's project for 2004-2007. January was the time for the State Regent to travel to Wichita to meet the Executive Board to familiarize ourselves with the hotel and discuss conference plans; to meet with the Bylaws Committee to "hammer out changes" needed mostly due to the switching of Continental Congress from April to July; to discuss the need to enhance each meeting to encourage greater participation of the membership; to encourage chapter's usage of their state and district officers and chairmen within their own districts for programs and problems; and to hear the "good and the bad" of the training needs for volunteer work for this Society.

February took this officer back to Washington, D.C. for the National Board of Management meeting. There were board luncheons at the DAR Hall, a State Regent's dinner at Old Ebbitt's Grill, which is the oldest restaurant in D.C., plus an evening twilight tour of the National Monuments. Your State Regent visited the Kansas Chapel and completed an inventory of the contents and discussed needs and plans with the Chaplain General and with the Administrator. Then there are always the visits to the library and stops at offices to pick up supplies and ask questions. After the official meeting, this officer took a tour of the new National Museum of the American Indian, which was a highlight and is recommended as a "must-see" on your next visit to the nation's capital city.

Countless hours of planning, finances and many Daughters have had input into this State Conference. We hope you will enjoy the time together and gain from this meeting, and go back to your chapters and encourage others to participate in the future by giving them glowing reports. Remember, positive attitudes are the best recruiting tool for membership.

This State Regent is looking forward to beginning her official chapter visits. Did you realize this State Regent has only officially been in office about eight months? She wishes to thank her state officers, state chairmen and state appointees and all members for your friendship, support and cooperation these past months. Know that your State Regent will be bringing Greetings from the Kansas Society at the Louisiana and Oklahoma Conferences prior to attending Continental Congress in July.

As we go forth into this year, remember to: Preserve Yesterday, Celebrate Today, Dream tomorrow.

With fifth-eight of Kansas Chapters reporting, programs or projects on historic preservation included: "Preservation of Bible Records," "Preserving Historic Textiles," visiting commemorative sites, "Flag Preservation," "Early Schools," "Churches and Cemetery Records," "Identifying Antique Quilts," "Use of Bells to Communicate," "Preserving Old Photos," "Organizing and Preserving Family Heirlooms," "History and Preservation of Christmas Carols," "Harvey Girls and the Restoration of National Fred Harvey Museum," "Tales of the Rails," "Battle of Black Jack," "Update on Dulcimers," "Christmas at the White House," and "Refurbishing Mt. Vernon". Programs on cultural events "Early Indian Tribes," "American Indian Education and or traditions: Language," "National Ranger Report on Brown Museum," "Native American Patriots," "Orphan Trains," "Kansas History," "God's Miracles of World War II," "Nez Pierce Indians," "Appalachian Mountain Christmas Traditions," "Bugle History," "Civil War Character - John Brown," Dedication of an Otoe Indian Cemetery by a member of the Otoe Tribe, "Underground Railroad Ouilts," and "Hanukkah Traditions." What an interesting array of subjects. Our members have done an excellent job of using historic preservation material. One chapter gave a NSDAR Historic Preservation Medal. Another chapter organized and catalogued their chapter history and collections and a third chapter provided docents for a museum. In addition, there were 2 entries in the contests - 1 in crafts and 1 in quilts.

#### NSDAR Award Outstanding Use of American History Spot Announcements

There were fifty-five chapters reporting the following information on American History programs: 178 given at chapter meetings; forty-seven given by members to other chapters; and twenty-eight programs about outstanding Americans. These reports included: American Revolution women, Zoo Adams, Ann Rogers Clark, Mary Retch, women in military, women's suffrage, Sacagawea, Lydia B. Darrough, Deborah S. Cammet, Eleanor Roosevelt, Helen Keller, Nancy Ward, Mother Bickerdyke, Harriet Tubman, Lady Vestey, Harvey girls, Emily Hawley, Ann Pamele Cunningham, Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cody Stanton, and Presidents wives. American History displays were placed in eighteen schools, and twenty-eight in libraries, museums, fairs, college or shopping centers. Nine chapters used spot announcements, sixty radio/TV minutes and 867 press inches. Twenty-seven schools participated in the essay contest with 238 students and 127 certificates given. Thirty award certificates were given, money to winners, and sixteen bronze medals. In the Christopher Columbus contest, three schools participated and one student participated. Twelve American History certificates and two silver medals were given for outstanding work in schools.

# NSDAR Awards Outstanding American Indians State Activity South Central Division – 2<sup>nd</sup> Place Outstanding Service as State Chairman Barbara Dale Bacone College DAR Native American Festival Peggy Boggs', Barbara Dale

Reports were received from fifty-five chapters. Contributions to the American Indian Scholarship Fund were \$166.00 and \$3.00 to Friends of the Bacone College contributions were \$302.50 with 345 American Indians. treasure chest items, 2,967 Campbell soup labels and 250 Betty Crocker labels. Eight members toured the museum and campus. Chemawa contributions were \$78.00 with 4,066 soup labels. The Quivira Crossing chapter sponsored "DAR-Phone Home" purchasing prepaid phone cards valued at \$450.00. The Youth Summer Camp donation was \$87.00. Additional work and donations with Native American groups as follows: soup labels to other groups, donations to Ogallala Lakota College in Kyle, South Dakota, Navajo Code Talkers, Southwest Indians Foundation, Oaks Indian Mission in Oaks, Oklahoma, Haskell Indian University, bird feathers to Zuni Pueblo, New Mexico and clothing and school supplies to the Heart of America Indian Other work included tutoring students with Indian heritage, Center. presentation at a school, work in Haskell University library, wrote letters to elementary schools and helped erect displays, working in the Shawnee Indian Mission and a clinic, attended Pow Wows, learned finger weaving, and attended study workshops. Proclamations were signed by the state governor and four mayors for National American Indian Heritage month in November.

### AMERICANISM

Of the chapters reporting, nine had referred to the DAR Manual for Citizenship on-line a total of twenty-three times. Two had referred naturalization applicants to the Manual on-line. Five hundred seventeen U.S. Flags were distributed to naturalization applicants and schools, along with 151 U.S. Flag pins, 2,948 bookmarks, 4,161 copies of the American's Creed, 2,306 copies of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, 1,494 copies of the Flag Code, forty-five copies of the Constitution booklet, eighty-two copies of the Flag Facts brochure, and one copy of the Story of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Twelve chapters participated in naturalization ceremonies or receptions, ranging from once to five times. A total of seventy-four members were involved in various aspects of these events. There were no nominees for the DAR Medal of Honor or the DAR Americanism Medal. An Americanism and DAR Manual for Citizenship chairman was reported by twenty-seven chapters, however the committees objectives have been shared with only nineteen chapters. Chapters have participated in a variety of patriotic activities; troop support, military send off or welcome home festivities, parades, community events and celebrations of all kinds.

# **CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT**

Sixty-one chapters, representing ninety-seven percent of our chapters submitted reports for the 2004-2005 year. Applause goes to chapters with new regents and committee chairmen for their attention to the details of the Chapter Achievement Award Form. Of those chapters reporting, all but one attained a level of achievement. It is a pleasure to report that thirty-eight chapters reported an increase in membership. Three chapters are receiving certificates of award for points achieved. They are Topeka with 688 points, Quivira Crossing with 595 points and Cimarron River Valley with 579 points. Unique projects included: an experiment with hungry goats in an attempt to eradicate the salt cedars that absorb much of the water from the Cimarron River, a stream bed repair which received a county Soil Conservation award, and collecting newspaper and used computer papers to be shredded for bedding at a zoo. Kansas Daughters volunteer for planting trees, shrubs, flowers, and

pulling weeds to reinvigorate existing floworbeds or revitalize abandoned ones. They even do roadside cleanup. Collecting aluminum cans is a favored method to fund DAR projects. An Autumn Brilliant Serviceberry tree was planted in Madonna Park in Council Grove; a Weeping White Cherry tree at Washburn University, a memorial tree was planted in Cody, Wyoming to honor Veterans, and the Newton Chapter dedicated a Bur Oak to Millicent Classen who had been their Conservation Chairman for fifty years. Three Conservation Medals were awarded for outstanding work.

Constitution Week was noted in central Kansas when your state chairman was a Salina Journal guest editorialist September 18th. Fifty-nine Constitution Week reports were received out of sixty-three chapters. Fifty-one chapters had some Constitution Week activity. Eight chapters had none. The Friends of the Library Committee has the purpose of providing special funds for purchases at our Library. Funds are needed during this administration to establish an online subscription service, which will bring more researchers into the Library. The cost to install this software on seventeen PC's within the Library is \$9,000 for an annual license. That would require forty-five new Friends per year. To become a Friend of the Library, one must contribute \$200 or more. This then qualifies the donor to purchase one of two pins from J. E. Caldwell: the Friends of the Library pin or the Library Life Member pin. This year in Kansas we had donations from the chapters of \$60. The implementation of document management software in the Registrar General's office will streamline that department's process. # **VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS**

The role of Volunteer Genealogists is changing but still vital to the application process Twenty of the fifty-four chapters who sent in the Master Questionnaire reported activity. Twenty-four books were purchased for the library; fifteen of them were memorials with more on order. The library received twenty-six books as gifts; fifteen were NSDAR lineage books. The KSDAR Genealogical Records Committee presented the library with twenty-two volumes. Library volunteers made eleven book orders, answered many e-

mails, and wrote forty-four "thank-yous" and other letters. Rowena White mailed monthly reports to Mary Frisch, State Treasurer, and wrote checks for all books orders and maintenance supplies. # STATE REGENT'S REPORT AT CONTINENTAL CONGRESS Sammy King Cope, State Regent

Holding the state flag of Kansas is Stacy Cope, the State Scholarship Chairman and my daughter.

This state regents three-year theme is "Freedom Rings...Preserve Yesterday, Celebrate Today, Dream Tomorrow".

Dedicated Kansas Daughters continue to participate in activities and projects that are vital in their communities, thus making DAR visible in their areas.

Kansas chapters have 100% web site plus two state web sites, a biyearly newspaper, a bimonthly e-newsletter all to keep Daughters abreast of the news and changes at the national, state and chapter levels.

Kansas supports its own genealogy library in Dodge City and the collection titles are online.

Kansas State Project is preserving the past for present and future generations at El Cuartelejo. Eighty years ago a pioneer couple deeded the Kansas Society several acres of land which now lays in the middle of Scott State Park in western Kansas. This land has on it the northernmost ruins of an eight room Indian pueblo from the 1600's. Over 25,000 artifacts have been excavated and moved to Arkansas University and some to the Smithsonian. El Cuartelejo was a location for a band of flecing Taos and Picuris Indians. It is designated as a registered National Historic Landmark. KSDAR has installed signs and fences, but the time has come for more. With the aid of the Kansas Historical Society, an interpretative center will be built to preserve, protect, and interpret the El Cuartelejo site.

Madam President General, it is an honor to serve as State Regent of the Kansas Society during your administration.

# KANSAS STATISTICAL REPORT

AMERICAN HERITAGE: 58 chapters reported programs/projects on historic events and preservation. Projects included providing museum docents and compiling a chapter history. 2 participants in Arts and Crafts contests. 1 Historic Preservation Medal.

AMERICAN HISTORY: 61 chapters reported 178 programs, 43 displays in schools/public places, 60 radio/TV minutes, 867 press inches, 30 schools and 238 students participated in American History Essay Contest and Christopher Columbus Contest with 2 silver and 16 bronze medals, 3 monetary, 139 certificates awarded for outstanding work.

AMERICAN INDIANS: 55 chapters reported program/projects/proclamations and contribution of \$183.00 to American Indian Scholarship Fund; \$3.00 to Friends of American Indians; \$126.00 to Chemawa and 4,066 soup labels; \$102.00 to Indian Youth of American Summer Camp Program and \$450.00 in prepaid phone cards; Bacone College \$303.00 plus 345 treasure chest items and 3,217 soup labels. Eight members toured Bacone College. President of Bacone and an archaeologist were state conference speakers on Indian ruins.

AMERICANISM: 100% chapters report with 74 members involved in naturalization activities. 517 flags, 151 flag pins, 2,948 bookmarks, 4,161 American Creeds, 2,396 Pledge to the flag, 1,494 flag codes, 45 Constitution booklets, 82 Flag Facts, 1 Story of Pledge of Allegiance to the U. S. Flag were distributed.

CHAPTER ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS: 61 chapters reported. Chapter Achievement Awards presented to 60 chapters. 38 chapters increased memberships.

CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION: C.A.R. is growing in Kansas. 5 chapters have dual DAR/C.A.R. memberships, 3 societies plus 1 reorganizing are supported by DAR chapters. 8 chapters had programs/or invited C.A.R. to their meetings. 26 new and pending members.

COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARDS: 9 awards were given by state chairman for 2004-2005 for outstanding work. Services included: VA interviews; VA hospital visits and services; zoo volunteer; animal shelter services; presenting an original patriotic program in 26 schools.

CONSERVATION: 46 chapters reported. 3 Conservation Medals were awarded. Programs/projects in conservation included: 4 memorial trees planted; aluminum cans and newspapers collected; birds and wildlife fed; a goat project to eradicate salt cedars on river bed. CONSTITUTION WEEK: 55 chapters reported programs/contests, 31 proclamations, 45 churches and schools rang bells. Displays in churches, libraries, schools, stores, TV/radio/news articles and bulletins. 15 events and programs. 3 certificates awarded for outstanding work.

DAR GOOD CITIZENS: 52 chapters contacted 103 schools. 58 schools participated, 51 students signed on, 21 applicants sent to state for judging. 51 participants were awarded \$1,900.00 in bonds, gifts, and patriotic memorabilia with honor awards at school assemblies, teas, luncheons, and in news articles. Kansas awarded Good Citizen winner a scholarship and our entry won the South Central Division.

DAR MAGAZINE: 55 chapters reported 40 gift subscriptions; information is used by most with historic places, history and genealogy the most popular. \$1,875.00 of co-op advertising space.

DAR MUSEUM: 5 docents and 2 correspondent docents. 4 programs presented; \$57.00 donated by 42 chapters to DAR Museum Exhibition Fund. Other donations to Adopt-an-Object Program, Button Gwinnett Signature, Friends of the Americana Collection fund, and Friends of American Fund totaled \$850.00.

DAR SCHOLARSHIP: 35 chapters reported activity. 23 chapters donated \$180.00 to the National Scholarship Fund. 4 chapters donated \$670.00 to scholarships and 3 members gave 3 memorial scholarships totaling over \$75,000.00. Kansas awarded 2 state scholarships with 7 applicants.

DAR SCHOOL: Kansans ring bells and wear butterflies to support DAR Schools. 17 chapters had programs. Donations included: 13,572 soup labels; 100 lbs. clothing; 868 box tops; 3 gift certificates; 56 lbs. can lids; 24,763 Betty Crocker points; 88 ink cartridges; and \$2,328.00 cash. 4 members attended the National bus tour and 2 serve on advisory committees for schools. President of Bacone College was state conference speaker.

DAR SERVICE FOR VETERANS: 62 chapters reported 12,706 hours by 484 volunteers that traveled 38,154 miles. In addition, 5 stories/photos to National Chairman, 57 veteran interviews for 178 hours of material, \$3,640.00 in cash and canteen books, \$34,835.00 in food donation, comfort items, magazines, books, and gifts were given. 65 lbs. stamps for wounded. South Central Division winner of DAR Veterans Volunteer in Extended Area and Outstanding Youth Volunteer.

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA: 63 chapters reported distributing 730 flags; 2,952 flag codes; 196 flag pins; 1,807 copies of

flag literature; purchase of a \$4,000.00 flagpole. Chapters recited pledge at all meetings, heard flag facts, and had various programs.

GENEALOGICAL RECORDS: 34 chapters reported. 1,749 pages were submitted to national in the form of 7 new complied books. 9 members work on Master Index Project completing 37 volumes this year. 7 worked on Bookworm project.

JUNIOR AMERICAN CITIZENS: 51 chapters reported with 6 chapters active. There were 544 entries in JAC contests of which 63 went to South Central Division. 869 inches of print/photos on JAC work in the news.

IUNIOR MEMBERSHIP: 56 chapters reported for the 156 junior members in Kansas. There are 34 chapter chairman, 12 chapter officers, 3 chapter regents, 1 state vice-chairman, 3 state chairmen, and 1 national chairman. \$271.00 was donated to the Helen Pouch Fund and \$1,632.00 in sales of national junior products. Kansas had an Outstanding Junior awarded.

LINEAGE RESEARCH: Kansas reports 36 research volunteers; 60 research reports processed; 24 new members resulted.

MEMBERSHIP: Kansas had 29 transfer in members; 41 chapters reported at least 1 new member; 144 new members in application with 27 Juniors; 20 chapters increased their membership. 140 members are 50-year members, 156 junior members, 52 MAL; 66 deceased.

NATIONAL DEFENSE PROGRAM: 100% reported. 55 chapters had a 3 minute report at meetings and 15 national defense programs. 19 Good Citizen Medals, 20 Bronze and 6 Gold ROTC Medals were awarded. \$97.00 donated to ROTC Award Fund.

PUBLIC RELATIONS, MOTION PICTURE, RADIO AND TELEVISION: Kansans heard about DAR: 581 newspaper articles; 143 photos; 787 radio/17 TV spots; 1 TV interview; 19 newsletters; 1 play written, videoed and presented to over 400 on closed circuit TV.

SEIMES TECHNOLOGY CENTER: Kansas donated \$333.00 to the Center.

VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SPECIALISTS: Kansas enjoys 100% chapter web sites (63), plus 2 state web sites; 20 issues to 326 members of Kansas e-newsletter. Volunteers for President General's digitalization project, patriot index project; web page review; 93 officers and 647 members report using computers, 9 new members, 18 papers pending and 33 prospective members from email contacts.

COMMEMORATIVE EVENTS: 58 chapters reported that 6 participated in Independence Day parade in Washington, D. C. on July 4 and 30 members in local parades. 13 field trips and 36 programs on Lewis and Clark Expedition, 45 Constitution Day, Veteran's parades.

DAR PROJECT PATRIOT: 40 chapters reported activity. 113 volunteers gave 69 hours; \$940.00 donated to project; 100 cards posted. Flag displays, programs, prayers, and parades.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY: Kansas donated \$280.00, 92 books were donated to the NSDAR Library.

INSIGNIA: Provided information on obtaining pins, proper display on ribbons. Several programs by chapters on insignia. J. E. Caldwell representative at state conference.

LITERACY CHALLENGE: 42 chapters reported activities by 176 members. 277 hours working with adults and 4,926 hours with children. 736 books donated.

PRESIDENT GENERAL'S PROJECT: 52 chapters reported. 2 chapters are 100%. Donations are \$6,321.00.

VOLUNTEER GENEALOGISTS: 54 chapters. 4 chapters sponsored workshops. 20 chapters had activity: 2 members attended 4 day Genealogy Consultant Training course; 14 have taken 5 day Volunteer Genealogist Training course; 17 attended 2 day Volunteer Training course.

WOMEN'S ISSUES: 48 chapters reported activity focusing on women's issues with programs and projects. State conference speaker on Living, Love and Laughter.

OTHER: State Project is the preservation of Kansas's property that has Indian pueblo ruins in cooperation with the State Historical Society. State Genealogy Library support continues and the collection in online.

### CORPORATE CHARTER OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

FIRST: The Name of the corporation is the KANSAS SOCIETY of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

SECOND: The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is Mary Frisch, State Treasurer, 24 Compton Court, Johnson County, Prairie Village, KS 66208-5204.

THIRD: This Corporation is organized NOT for profit, and the objects and purposes to be transacted and carried on are:

(1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of all patriotic anniversaries.

(2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing a enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

(3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

(4) This corporation shall have power to receive title to real and personal property by gift, devise, bequest or purchase; to own, hold, sell, convey, lease and re lease, let and sublet real and personal property; and to manage, invest, reinvest or disburse the funds that may accrue from the holdings of such property in the manner provided by the Bylaws of the Kansas Society as now constituted or as hereafter amended. This corporation shall have the power to sue and to be sued.

No officer, director or member of this corporation shall be individually liable for the obligations of the corporation.

These articles may be amended by two-thirds vote, provided a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society. This corporation shall have such other authority as may be provided in the Bylaws of the Kansas Society, not in contravention of the provisions of this Charter or the laws of the State of Kansas.

This corporation shall not have authority to issue capital stock.

FOURTH: The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation, and shall be the managers of the business of the corporation and shall hold, manage and control all property of the corporation.

The members of the Kansas Society and all persons who shall hereafter become members, who are in good standing under the Bylaws of said Society, shall be members of this corporation.

FIFTH: The term for which this corporation is to exist is ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

## BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

## Revised by the Ninety-third KSDAR Conference March 6, 1991 Amended 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1999, 2000, 2003, and 2005

### **ARTICLE I**

#### Title

The name of this organization shall be the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

#### ARTICLE II Object

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the state of Kansas:

(1)To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries;

(2)To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American People, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American Citizens;

(3)To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom; to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

# ARTICLE III Members

#### Section 1. Members.

The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in the state of Kansas.

# Section 2. New Chapters.

The State Organizing Secretary shall notify the Executive Committee the following information about a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society: name and location, date of organization, names and addresses of its chapter officers and members, and chapter code number. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society and to belong to a District according to its location.

# ARTICLE IV Fees and Dues

#### Section 1. Fiscal Year.

The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be January 1 through December 31.

#### Section 2. Dues.

The annual state dues of a chapter shall be \$3.50 per chapter member, payable to the State Treasurer showing a Federal Postal Service or other carrier cancellation date no later than December 1. Only a member whose state dues have been paid by December 1 shall be eligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference.

The dues of a member admitted or reinstated after April 1 shall be credited for the next succeeding calendar year.

#### Section 3. District Dues.

A registration fee, not to exceed \$5.00, may be collected at each of the Annual District Meetings from the members of that District who attend; the fee shall be set and disbursed according to the approved procedures.

# Section 4. Additional Payments.

(a) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the annual state dues received from each chapter member five cents for the support of the Kansas State Society Children of the American Revolution. The KSDAR State Treasurer shall forward these funds to the K.S.C.A.R. Senior State Treasurer.

(b) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the annual state dues received from each chapter member ten cents for the Kansas DAR Library Fund to help meet the annual library expenses of rent, insurance, operating costs and purchases and maintenance of equipment.

#### ARTICLE V Officers

# Section 1. Officers.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Reporter.

# Section 2. Eligibility.

To be eligible for the office of State Regent or State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state of Kansas for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as a Chapter Regent for at least one-half of the chapter term.

To be eligible for any other state office, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state of Kansas for at least two years.

No member, except the State Treasurer, shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served two terms in any state office shall be eligible to any other state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year. No member shall be eligible for any state office as a district officer-elect.

A member having served more than one-half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.

# Section 3. Term.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and State Vice Regent is confirmed.

# Section 4. Expenses.

The expenses of the State Officers, as approved in the budget, shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment. Requests to be reimbursed for additional expenses shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the Executive Committee for its action.

# Section 5. Vacancies.

If the office of State Regent becomes vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent.

Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee, with the approval of the State Board of Management, until the next regular meeting of the State Conference, when the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by the Kansas Society.

# Section 6. Automatic Resignation.

Any State Officer unable to carry out the duties of her office for a period of six months automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer, unless ruled otherwise by the State Regent with the approval of the Executive Committee.

#### Section 7. Honorary State Regent.

In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, a member who has served as State Regent, upon her retirement from office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life. Election shall be at State Conference and may be by voice vote. An Honorary State Regent is entitled to a vote at the State Conference.

# ARTICLE VI Nominations and Elections

# Section 1. Election.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be elected at the State Conference every third year, coinciding with the year of election of National Executive Officers. The election shall be by ballot unless there is but one nominee for each office, in which case, by general consent, the written ballot may be dispensed with and the vote for the entire ticket taken by voice.

## Section 2. Nominating Committee.

(a) Members.

The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members. The chairman and an alternate shall be elected at the September State Board of Management meeting during the third year of the administration. Each District shall elect one committee member and an alternate at its annual District meeting which follows.

No member shall be eligible to serve on the Nominating Committee for consecutive terms.

#### (b)Duties.

Before October 1, the chairman of the Nominating Committee shall notify, in writing, all chapters of the impending election and shall indicate the final date on which the names of members to be considered for state offices shall be received from the chapters.

The committee shall select one nominee for each office. In its selection of candidates, the committee shall endeavor to represent each of the four Districts. No chapter shall have more than one member serving as a State Officer at a time. No nominee shall be eligible for election to a state office unless a chapter endorsement, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary, is received by the Chairman of the Nominating Committee prior to the election.

By January 15, the report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent to the State Officers, the Honorary State Regents and the Chapter Regents.

The report of the Nominating Committee shall be presented at the State Conference. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary. The ballot for the election at State Conference shall be prepared by the chairman of the Nominating Committee.

# Section 3. Vice President General.

A candidate for Vice President General from Kansas shall be endorsed by a majority vote by ballot at a State Conference. No endorsement for Vice President General shall be made more than eighteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated in the motion.

#### ARTICLE VII Duties of Officers

## Section 1. General Duties.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by its parliamentary authority.

Each State Officer shall type an annual report of less than two hundred words: before March 1, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and two copies to the State Recording Secretary. These annual reports shall be presented at the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Within thirty days after the State Conference, each retiring State Officer, with the exception of the State Recording Secretary, shall deliver to her successor a written procedure of the requirements of her office, a list of the KSDAR property in her custody, and all records and property of the Kansas Society, and she shall obtain a receipt for these items. A duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in custody shall be sent to the State Regent-elect. The State Recording Secretary's deadline shall be September 1.

# Section 2. State Regent.

The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee.

She shall be the executive officer and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society.

She shall appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee, naming the chairman of each; shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee; shall appoint a State Parliamentarian; shall cosign all checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts; shall plan the schedule for the September Tour; shall plan and prepare the program for the State Conference and shall approve the arrangements, contract and payments made by the State Conference Chairman and the State Conference Committees.

Along with the State Treasurer, signature cards for all bank accounts and for the safe-deposit box (containing the bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds of the Kansas Society) shall bear her signature and she shall possess a key to the safe-deposit box. She shall receive from the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen all statements of expenses, as approved in the budget and present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment.

At the beginning of her term of office, she shall file with the insurance company a complete and current inventory of the materials and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library.

With the assistance of the State Vice Regent or any other member whom she designates, she shall oversee the printing and distribution of the official KSDAR stationery.

She shall send each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the national committees and of any other appointees and shall notify the Chapter Regents of all changes in personnel and addresses of National and State Officers and appointees.

She shall endeavor to visit each chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Prior to their publication, the State Regent shall approve the final copies of the "Kansas DAR News" and the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.

## Section 3. State Vice Regent.

In the absence or inability of the State Regent, the State Vice Regent shall perform the duties of the office of State Regent.

The State Vice Regent shall preside at the Chapter Regents' banquet at the State Conference and shall work with the State Regent and the District Directors in planning the District meetings.

If requested, she shall assist the State Regent with the printing and/or distribution of the official KSDAR stationery.

She shall receive from the Chapter Regents their annual lists of names, addresses and telephone numbers of Chapter Chairmen of state and national committees; she shall collate for each State Committee Chairman a listing of the Chapter Chairmen of her committee.

She shall perform any other duties designated to her by the State Regent.

#### Section 4. State Chaplain.

The State Chaplain shall open and close meetings of the Kansas Society with the reading of scripture and prayer and conduct such religious services as occasion may require.

She shall conduct a Memorial Service at each State Conference; she shall receive the necrology from the State Registrar and prepare the printed program.

She shall send notes of sympathy to the families of recently deceased members.

# Section 5. State Recording Secretary.

(a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee and the Finance Committee.

She shall notify State Officers, Chapter Regents and State Committee Chairmen of any actions taken at these meetings affecting their duties.

She shall maintain the official membership roll of the State Board of Management.

She may cosign checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts. She shall be a member of the Finance Committee.

Each year she shall file the annual reports of State Officers, Chapter Regents, District Directors and State Committee Chairmen until October 1.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile, edit and publish the Annual Report and Proceedings of the State Conference. A committee to assist with this duty may be selected by the State Recording Secretary. She shall provide to the State Regent who presided at the State Conference a final proof copy of the Proceedings prior to its publication.

By November 1, the Recording Secretary shall distribute the Proceedings to those specified in the Standing Rules.

# Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary.

The State Corresponding Secretary shall maintain the official Kansas Society mailing list of the members who are to receive meeting notices, shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society, and shall assist the State Regent in her official correspondence.

She shall notify the State Officers and the delegates of any special meetings that may be called.

She shall send out notices of meetings of the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior.

Immediately after a State Conference at which an election is held, she shall send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the newly elected state officers.

Each year by January 31, she shall send the official call for the State Conference to the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, the State Committee Chairmen and the District Directors.

Each year by January 31, she shall send each Chapter Regent one credentials form and one form for reporting chapter officers, which shall be duplicated and returned by the Chapter Regents. She shall compile the lists of chapter officers reported by the Chapter Regents and, before Continental Congress, send one set to the Organizing Secretary General and one set to the State Regent. She shall file the remaining set. Each year by June I, she shall send lists of the names and addresses of the current Chapter Regents to the State Recording Secretary for publication in the Annual Report and Proceedings and to the State Reporter for publication in the "Kansas DAR News." If requested by a State Officer, she shall provide a list of corresponding chapter officers.

She shall prepare the state information packet state packet from letters provided by the State Officers and State Committee Chairmen. She shall be responsible for distributing the state packet during the State Board of Management and District meetings and for mailing, by October 1, any packets that have not been collected during the fall meetings.

# Section 7. State Organizing Secretary.

The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and Chapter Organizing Regents in the organization of new chapters.

She shall be responsible for the correspondence related to the organization of a new chapter, and she shall notify the Executive Committee the following information about a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society: name and location, date of organization, names and addresses of its chapter officers and members, and chapter code number. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society and a District assignment shall be made.

She shall determine the possibilities for new chapters within the state and shall assist existing chapters in maintaining their memberships and in gaining new members.

# Section 8. State Treasurer.

The State Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all funds and securities of the Kansas Society. She shall deposit them in the name of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution and shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the State Conference. All checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts shall be cosigned by the State Regent, except in cases of emergency when the State Recording Secretary may cosign.

Upon assuming the duties of her office, she may transfer the checking accounts to a convenient, federally insured banking institution, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee; this action shall be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management.

She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on December 31, and submit them for audit to a public accountant. She shall present the auditor's report at the Annual State Conference.

She shall serve as the chairman of the Finance Committee. (See Article XI, Section 4.)

Prior to the State Conference, she shall report to the State Credentials Committee Chairman the number of votes to which each chapter is entitled. After the delegates and alternates are elected, she shall verify their eligibility for the State Credentials Committee. She shall be bonded in the amount of \$10,000; the fee to be paid by the Kansas Society.

She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities, and other evidence of invested funds and shall rent a safe deposit box for their safekeeping. A key to the safe-deposit box shall be issued to the State Treasurer and to the State Regent.

Signature cards for all bank accounts and the safe-deposit box shall bear the signatures of the State Regent and State Treasurer.

She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall be responsible for their transfer to her successor at the close of the term.

# Section 9. State Registrar.

The State Registrar shall keep the files containing the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, when possible, the names of the members at large residing in Kansas. The record shall include: full name, including maiden name and, if married, husband's full name; full date of admittance by the National Society; national number; name of chapter or, if the member has belonged to more than one chapter, the names of her original and current chapters; name and rank of ancestor, with name of child through whom the lineage is traced; colony or state, and branch of service in which the ancestor served; and the dates and locations of any transfers. The State Registrar shall receive the membership changes from the Chapter Registrars. She shall update the membership files with the information reported by the chapters, including changes in membership by admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address.

She shall prepare and send duplicate forms to each Chapter Registrar for the chapter's annual membership report, which shall list the members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, reinstated, transferred, married, divorced, or who have died during the preceding year. Newly accepted Junior Members and their dates of birth shall also be listed on the annual report. She shall send one set of the forms to the State Treasurer by June 1.

She shall assist the editor of the "Kansas DAR News" in maintaining a current mailing list.

## Section 10. State Historian.

The State Historian shall direct such historical work as may be required by the Kansas Society or suggested by the National Society.

She shall keep a file of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

She shall prepare and submit an annual report to the Historian General.

She shall keep a reference record of the archives of the Kansas Society and, at the close of her term, shall prepare copies of the inventory for the following incoming officers: State Regent, State Vice Regent, and State Historian.

At the close of the administration, she shall prepare a summary of the highlights of the past three years to be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

# Section 11. State Librarian.

The State Librarian shall have supervision of the Kansas DAR Library and shall serve as the chairman of the State Library Committee.

She shall be responsible for all books, papers, microfilm, microfiche, and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library. She shall keep a current list of all the materials and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library and shall submit to the State Regent duplicate copies of the list, one of which shall be for the insurance company.

She shall list in her annual report all materials sent to the NSDAR Library and all those accepted for the Kansas DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

She shall work with the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee in maintaining the Kansas DAR Library.

# Section 12. State Reporter.

The State Reporter shall be the editor of the "Kansas DAR News" and shall keep a file of the current Kansas Society mailing list.

She shall provide to the State Regent a final proof copy of each issue of the "Kansas DAR News" prior to its publication.

She shall be ex officio a member of the Public Relations Committee and the State Conference Public Relations Committee.

Each year she shall send a report of the State Conference to the DAR magazine of the National Society.

# ARTICLE VIII Meetings

## Section 1. Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in the Spring. The date and location of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent and the host District. The meeting shall be for the purpose of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the Chapter Regents, the District Directors, and the State Chairmen of all committees; the election of officers; and for any other business that may arise.

# Section 2. Voting Members.

The voting members of the State Conference or any special meeting of the Kansas Society shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose memberships are within the state, the Honorary State Regents, each Chapter Regent or, in her absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the State Conference. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at the Annual State Conference, shall be limited to one vote.

# Section 3. Qualifications.

Each chapter entitled to representation at the Continental Congress, in accordance with the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the National Society, shall be entitled to representation at the State Conference, provided that its members' state dues are credited to the State Treasurer by December 1 and its State Credentials Forms have been completed in accordance with these bylaws.

Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters by February 1 each year and reported by February 8 on State Credentials Forms (See Article XIII, Section 4(b), of these bylaws). A delegate or an alternate shall have been a member of her chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which she is elected and shall be in good standing with the National and Kansas Societies at the time of her election, as verified by the State Treasurer.

The Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter may be a delegate.

# Section 4. Chapter Delegates and Alternates.

(a) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any meeting of the Kansas Society during the year, beginning January 1, shall be based upon the number of members whose national and state dues for the current year have been paid by the December 1 preceding the State Conference, provided that the chapter meets the qualifications for representation in accordance with Section 3 of this Article. A member whose national and state dues are delinquent shall not be counted in determining representation at the meetings of the Kansas Society, shall not be entitled to vote for delegates or alternates to meetings of the Kansas Society, and shall not be entitled to act as representative or alternate at such meetings.

(b) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any other meeting of the Kansas Society shall be as follows:

| 12 through 49 members   | Regent and two delegates   | 3 votes |
|-------------------------|----------------------------|---------|
| 50 through 199 members  | Regent and five delegates  | 6 votes |
| 200 through 299 members | Regent and eight delegates | 9 votes |

(c) The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of voters to which the chapter is entitled.

# Section 5. Privileges.

(a) Any member of the National Society who is a member in good standing of a chapter in the Kansas Society or a member-at-large residing in Kansas may attend the State Conference.

(b) State Committee Chairmen and District Directors who are not elected delegates shall have the privilege to speak without vote.

# Section 6. State Conference Registration.

Kansas members who attend any session or meal of the State Conference shall pay a registration fee, determined by the State Regent, not to exceed \$5.00. This fee shall be paid to the State Conference Treasurer toward the expenses of the State Conference. Any balance remaining after the approved bills have been paid shall be sent to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the General Fund. Payment of all bills of the State Conference shall be approved by voucher, signed by the State Regent and the State Conference Chairman.

# Section 7. State Conference Chairman.

A State Conference Chairman shall be appointed annually by the State Regent.

It shall be the duty of the State Conference Chairman to be responsible for planning and coordinating the arrangements of the State Conference under the supervision of the State Regent and in cooperation with the host District. After conferring with the State Conference Chairman, the State Regent shall appoint the State Conference Treasurer; the State Conference Committees, including Public Relations, Registration, and other such committees as deemed necessary; and the members to assist the Credentials Committee Chairman. The State Conference Chairman shall assign the various functions at the State Conference to the chapters in the host District and shall serve as an advisor for their plans.

Along with the State Regent, she shall sign on vouchers for payments of State Conference expenses.

The State Conference Treasurer shall receive the registration fees and the payments for meal reservations. She shall pay the bills of the State Conference which have been approved by vouchers bearing the signatures of the State Regent and the State Conference Chairman. After all approved bills have been paid; she shall send any balance remaining in the State Conference account to the State Treasurer.

## Section 8. Special Meetings.

Special meetings of the Kansas Society may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. The purpose of the meeting shall be stated in the call. Except in cases of emergency, at least fifteen days notice shall be given, and only the business specified in the call shall be transacted. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be the delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society, which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

# Section 9. Quorum.

Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at the State Conference or any special meeting of the Kansas Society.

## ARTICLE IX State Board of Management

### Section 1. Members.

The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the state, and each Chapter Regent in the state or, in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent.

State Chairman of Committees, District Directors, and Honorary State Regents may attend the meeting of the State Board of Management with voice but no vote.

## Section 2. Officers.

The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

## Section 3. Meetings.

Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the September preceding the Annual District Meetings and the second meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. Except in cases of emergency, at least thirty days' notice of the time and location of the meetings shall be given.

## Section 4. Authority.

The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, except that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

## Section 5. Duties.

The State Board of Management shall report annually to the State Conference, shall ratify any decisions made by the Executive Committee, and may make recommendations to the State Conference.

It shall approve any appointment made by the Executive Committee to fill a vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent. It shall elect the chairman and an alternate of the State Nominating Committee at the September State Board of Management meeting in the third year of an administration.

It shall approve the budget submitted by the Finance Committee, shall ratify any transfer of funds by the State Treasurer, and shall consider any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society.

# Section 6. Special Meetings.

Special meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior.

### Section 7. Quorum.

Eleven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Board of Management.

# ARTICLE X

### **Executive Committee**

### Section 1. Members.

The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

### Section 2. Meetings.

The Executive Committee shall hold meetings prior to the regularly scheduled meetings of the State Board of Management, at the call of the State Regent, or upon the written request of three of its members. Except in cases of emergency, at least ten days' notice shall be given.

### Section 3. Authority.

The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society between the meetings of the State Board of Management. The Executive Committee shall be subject to the orders of the State Conference, and none of its acts shall conflict with action taken by the Kansas Society.

### Section 4. Duties.

The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact business between meetings of the State Board of Management and to report all actions and recommendations to the next meeting of the State Board.

It shall approve the standing and special committees appointed by the State Regent.

It shall declare a vacancy in any state office or committee for failure to perform stated duties; shall rule on any exception to an automatic resignation of a State Officer; shall fill any vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent, subject to the approval of the State Board of Management.

It shall approve any transfer of funds made by the State Treasurer.

It shall consider any special matters or recommendations concerning the Kansas DAR Library referred to it by the State Library Committee.

It shall receive and act upon requests for reimbursements of additional expenses submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, by the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen.

# Section 5. Emergency Business.

When necessary, the Executive Committee may conduct business by mail or telephone or electronic communication.

# Section 6. Quorum.

Seven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Executive Committee.

# ARTICLE XI

## Committees

# Section 1. Standing Committees.

The standing committees of the Kansas Society shall be: Bylaws, Credentials, Finance, Kansas DAR Scholarship, Resolutions, and State Library.

# Section 2. Bylaws Committee.

The Bylaws Committee shall be composed of a chairman and four members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Bylaws Committee to consider all properly submitted proposals for amendments and to present amendments and recommendations concerning the Bylaws to the State Conference for action.

Amendments and recommendations from the chapters, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, or the previous State Conference shall be presented to the committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. (See Article XV, Section 1.)

The committee shall have the right to edit proposed amendments and the right to originate amendments.

Previous notice of all proposed amendments from the Bylaws Committee shall be sent to all chapters thirty days prior to the State Conference.

# Section 3. Credentials Committee.

The Credentials Committee Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent. She shall be assisted by members of the host District for State Conference and shall be advised by the State Treasurer and the State Registrar. It shall be the duty of the chairman to supply the State Credentials Forms to the State Corresponding Secretary, to advise chapters of the number of delegates and alternates to which they are entitled and to receive their State Credentials Forms each year, showing a Federal Postal Service or other carrier cancellation date no later than February 8. She shall examine the returned forms and shall verify with the State Treasurer and State Registrar the eligibilities of the delegates and alternates listed. She shall have charge of the registration and its committee at the State Conference and shall submit credentials reports to the assembly.

It shall be the duty of the Credentials Committee to have the responsibility for the proper identification and registration of the delegates and the alternates attending the State Conference.

# Section 4. Finance Committee.

The Finance Committee shall be composed of the State Treasurer, who shall serve as chairman; the State First Vice Regent; the State Recording Secretary; and two members appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The recommended budget shall be submitted to the State Conference for action.

The Finance Committee shall report any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society to the State Board of Management.

# Section 5. Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee.

The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee to select the recipients of the Kansas DAR Scholarship and the Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship from the eligible applicants. Funds for the Kansas DAR Scholarship are provided from interest on designated investments.

It shall also be the duty of this committee to select the Kansas Society's candidate for the NSDAR American History Scholarship.

The committee shall follow the guidelines set forth in the special section concerning Scholarships.

### Section 6. Resolutions Committee.

The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Resolutions Committee to consider all submitted resolutions, evaluating their suitability according to the guidelines of the National Society, and to present resolutions to the State Conference for action.

Resolutions may be submitted by chapters or individual members. Except for a courtesy resolution, all resolutions shall have been previously submitted to the committee in order to be considered for a State Conference. To be considered for a State Conference, a resolution shall be submitted to the committee by February 15 immediately preceding.

The committee shall have the right to edit submitted resolutions and to originate resolutions. The courtesy resolution shall be prepared and presented by the Resolutions Committee Chairman.

# Section 7. State Library Committee.

The State Library Committee shall be composed of the State Librarian, who shall serve as chairman, and four members appointed by the State Regent. The Committee may meet quarterly and shall meet upon the request of the State Regent.

The State Library committee shall have the authority to select and purchase genealogical materials for the Kansas DAR Library, which will benefit the members of the chapters in the Kansas Society; all such purchases shall be subject to the approval of the State Regent and shall be made from donated funds designated for that purpose.

It shall be the duty of the State Library Committee to bring any special matters concerning the Kansas DAR Library to the attention of the Executive Committee and to request approval of purchases of non-routine equipment and supplies, which exceed the balance designated for that purpose in the Library Petty Cash Fund.

It shall promote greater use by loan of the books in the Kansas DAR Library and shall encourage donations of genealogical books, periodicals and other materials from chapters, members of chapters, and other interested individuals.

It shall serve as an advisor to the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee. The Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee shall be composed of members of the Dodge City Chapter, who shall be appointed by the Chapter Regent. It shall be the duty of this committee to assist the State Librarian in maintaining the materials and equipment of the State Library and in providing library services to members, according to the guidelines set by the Executive Committee.

# Section 8. Other Committees.

Such other committees, standing or special, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society may authorize or as the National Society may require. The State Regent shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

# Section 9. Committee Appointments.

Appointments of committee chairmen and members shall be concurrent with the term of the appointing State Regent.

## Section 10. Expenses.

The expenses of the State Committee Chairmen, as approved in the budget, shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment. Additional expenses shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the Executive Committee.

# Section 11. Reports.

Each State Committee Chairman shall type an annual report of less than two hundred words: before March 1, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and one copies to the State Recording Secretary. These annual reports shall be presented at the State conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings. The oral reports cannot be given if the written report is not on file.

Each State Committee Chairman shall prepare and send by the designated deadline a report to the Vice Chairman of the South Central Division of her committee. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent.

# Section 12. Transfer of Records and Property.

At the completion of her term, each State Committee Chairman shall deliver to the State Regent-elect or, if so instructed, to the newly appointed State Chairman of her committee, a written procedure of the requirements of her chairmanship, a list of the KSDAR property in her custody, and all records and property of the Kansas Society, and she shall obtain a receipt for these items. She shall provide a duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in her custody for the State Regent-elect.

### ARTICLE XII Districts

## Section 1. Names.

The Kansas Society shall be divided into four Districts: the Northeast District, the Northwest District, the Southeast District, and the Southwest District. The chapters in each District are designated in the Standing Rules.

# Section 2. Jurisdiction.

The four Districts are under the jurisdiction of the Kansas Society. Each District shall have the privilege to allow for any traditional procedures and courtesies, provided that they shall not conflict with the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the National and Kansas Societies.

## Section 3. Meetings.

(a) The meetings of the Districts shall be held for the general purpose of expanding the programs of the National and Kansas Societies, to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members, and to acquaint them with the State Officers and the State Committee Chairman.

(b) The Annual District Meetings shall be held in the September, following the State Board of Management, for the purpose of receiving the reports of its officers and conducting the business of the District. In the second year of an administration, each District shall elect a District Nominating Committee, and in the third year of an administration, each district shall elect a member and an alternate to represent the district on the State Nominating Committee. District officers shall be elected at the Annual District Meeting during the third year of an administration. The schedule for the meetings shall be published in the "Kansas DAR News".

# Section 4. Officers.

The officers shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, and a Secretary-Treasurer. Officers shall be elected for a term of three years at the Annual District Meeting preceding the election of the State Officers and shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the Chapter Regents' banquet at the State Conference. No member shall be eligible to succeed herself in the same District office. A member may serve consecutive terms in the three offices of her District; such consecutive service shall be limited to three terms.

### Section 5. State Conference.

The Districts shall host the State Conference by rotation in the following order: the Northwest District, the Northeast District, the Southeast District, and the Southwest District. If necessary, the rotation order may be altered. The chapters in the host District shall be assigned responsibilities for the State Conference by the State Conference Chairman.

# ARTICLE XIII Chapters

### Section 1. Officers.

The chapters shall elect their officers by February 1 of the year in which they elect officers. Newly elected chapter officers shall assume the duties of their offices.

### Section 2. Chapter Officer Report Forms.

Each year before March 1, the Chapter Regent shall report the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year. This report shall be made on forms from the office of the Organizing Secretary General which are furnished to the chapters by the State Corresponding Secretary and shall include the names and addresses of all chapter officers, whether newly elected or completing the term of election; the date of election; the date on which office is assumed; and the length of term. The report form shall be signed by the designated officers, and one original and two photocopies shall be returned to the State Corresponding Secretary by the March 1 deadline.

## Section 3. Provision for Fees and Dues in Chapter Bylaws.

A chapter may provide in its bylaws for fees and dues for chapter use in addition to national and state dues, but may not levy assessments in excess of the requirements of its bylaws. The bylaws of a chapter shall prescribe a date for collection of chapter dues sufficiently in advance to meet the requirements for payment to the National and Kansas Societies before December 1.

### Section 4. Representation and Return of Credentials Forms.

(a) Delegates and alternates to the Continental Congress shall be elected on or before the first day of the second month preceding the month of Continental Congress of each year. Using blanks furnished by the National Society, the name of the Chapter Regent and First Vice Regent and a list of the delegates and alternates shall be sent to the chairman of the Credentials Committee and to the State Regent, bearing a postmark no later than the 15<sup>th</sup> day of the second month preceding the month of Continental Congress.

Only a chapter member in good standing, whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society, shall be eligible to represent her chapter at meetings of the National Society. (National Bylaws, Article VIII, Section 2(e).)

(b) Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by February 1 of each year. (For number and qualifications of delegates and alternates to State Conference, see Article VIII, Section 3 and 4, of these bylaws.) The name of the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent and a list of the delegates and alternates and the date of their election shall be typewritten on the State credentials Form, which is furnished to the chapter by the Kansas Society in a January mailing from the State Corresponding Secretary, and shall be photocopied and sent to the State Registrar, the State Treasurer, and the State Credentials Committee Chairman by February 8.

Only a chapter member in good standing with the National and Kansas Societies, whose state credentials have been completed in accordance to these bylaws, shall be eligible to represent her chapter at meetings of the Kansas Society.

Kansas members who attend any session or meal of the State Conference shall pay a registration fee, determined by the State Regent, not to exceed \$5.00.

## Section 5. Chapter Regent.

Annually before August 1, each Chapter Regent shall send to the State Vice Regent a listing of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of her chapter's chairmen of national and state committees.

The Chapter Regent is responsible for completing and returning by the stated deadlines the copies of the chapter credentials forms after the election on or before February 1 of the chapter representatives to the Continental Congress and the State Conference.

Each Chapter Regent shall type an annual report of less than two hundred words: before March 1, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and two copies to the State Recording Secretary. These annual reports shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

# Section 6. Chapter Chaplain.

The Chapter Chaplain shall report deaths immediately to the State Chaplain. Information about the deceased member shall include her name and national number, date of death, name and address of next of kin, and any offices held in the chapter or in the State and National Societies. A newspaper obituary shall be sent with the report of a member's death.

# Section 7. Chapter Treasurer.

(a) Each year before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer shall remit the annual national dues of \$25.00 for every active member in the chapter to the Office of the Treasurer General. The computer printout of the chapter membership, received by the Chapter Treasurer from the Office of the Treasurer General by September 15, shall accompany the chapter's payment of annual national dues.

Payments to the Treasurer General, other than those remitted with the computer printout, shall be accompanied by remittance blanks, which may be ordered free of charge from the Officer of the Treasurer General. Payments for which remittance blanks are required include additional annual national dues and fees for applications, reinstatements, and supplementals.

All checks remitted to the National Society shall be made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR.

(b) Each year before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer shall remit the annual state dues of \$3.50 for every active member in the chapter to the State Treasurer. A computer printout of the chapter membership, received by the Chapter Treasurer from the State Treasurer in September, shall accompany the chapter's payment of annual state dues. Only a member whose state dues have been paid by December 1 shall be eligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference.

Each year before December 31, the Chapter Treasurer shall also send to the State Treasurer all chapter contributions for the National Society and the Kansas Society, including the required payments designated in the KSDAR Standing Rules, accompanied by the State Treasurer's Remittance Form. Only payments received by the State Treasurer by December 31 will be processed for that year's reporting period; payments received after December 31 will be applied to the succeeding calendar year's reporting period.

All checks remitted to the Kansas Society shall be made payable to the Kansas Society DAR.

(c) The Chapter Treasurer shall report all changes in membership as they occur to her Chapter Registrar.

### Section 8. Chapter Registrar.

The Chapter Registrar shall report to the Organizing Secretary General, in writing, all changes in membership, marriages, divorces, deaths, resignations, transfers, and changes of address as they occur (Bylaws of the National Society, Article XIII, Section 11). These reports of membership changes shall be made on Membership Change Forms and directed to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General, Membership Office. Membership Change Forms may be obtained from the Membership Office.

The Chapter Registrar shall report all changes in membership, in writing, to the State Registrar. She shall report all information necessary for the State Registrar to keep her records exact. Changes in membership by admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address shall be reported on State Registrar's Report Forms.

Information about newly admitted members shall include: full name, including maiden name and, if married husband's full name; full date of admittance; national number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor, with name of the child through whom the lineage is traced; colony or state, and branch of service in which the ancestor served. Information about members transferring into the Kansas Society from out of state shall include, in addition to the information required for newly admitted members, the name and location of former chapters and dates of transfers.

She shall complete the chapter's Annual Membership Report Form, supplied by the State Registrar, and return it to the State Registrar by February 15. Information listed on the annual membership report shall list members who have been accepted, dropped, resigned, reinstated, transferred, married, divorced, or who have died during the preceding year. Newly admitted Junior Members, with dates of birth, shall also be listed on the annual report.

## **ARTICLE XIV**

# **Parliamentary Authority**

The rules contained in the current edition of *Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised* shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

### ARTICLE XV Amendments

### Section 1.

These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the State Conference, and that the amendment has been proposed by the State Bylaws committee, the State Board of Management, the previous State Conference, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society. An amendment proposed by a chapter shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

# Section 2.

Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is adopted.

# Section 3.

Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the Kansas Society or the chapters in the state shall become the law of the Kansas Society and chapters without further notice.

## ARTICLE XVI Dissolution

Although the period of duration of the Kansas Society is perpetual, if for any reason the Kansas Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Kansas Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Kansas Society. Upon the dissolution of the Kansas Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

# SPECIAL SCHOLARSHIPS Revised by the KSDAR Executive Committee March 12, 2003, 2005

Number 1. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship shall be given the third year of each KSDAR administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four-year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of national defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity, and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Committee Chairman, the State National Defense Committee Chairman, and the State Regent.

**Number 2.** The Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship shall provide a college scholarship for a girl graduating from high school. The recipient of this scholarship shall have acceptable scholastic ability, show financial need, be a citizen of the United States of America, and be eligible for membership in the DAR. This award will be given the second year of each KSDAR administration. The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee shall select the recipient.

If the two rooms at the Shawnee Mission in Fairway, Kansas, formerly supported by the KSDAR are again maintained and refurbished by the Kansas Daughters, the interest from this fund shall be used for these purposes and take precedence over the scholarship fund.

Number 3. The Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship, in memory of her parents, Albert Jesse Jones and Mabel Clare Early Jones, shall be awarded to a deserving boy or girl, preferably one who is at least <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> Pottawatomie Indian. If a deserving individual of Pottawatomie heritage is not available, another Indian heritage may be substituted. The interest from the \$3,000 gift shall be awarded the first year of a KSDAR administration for attendance at an accredited college or university. Members of the scholarship committee who will supervise the awarding of the scholarship shall consist of the KSDAR Scholarship Committee Chairman, the KSDAR American Indians Committee Chairman and a member of the Eunice Sterling Chapter.

**Number 4.** A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school student who has DAR eligibility or is a member of DAR. Proof of enrollment in a two or four year accredited college or university shall be required. Members of the state DAR Scholarship Committee shall select the recipient.

**Number 5.** A Good Citizen scholarship shall be awarded annually following the rules set forth in the Good Citizen contest.

# STANDING RULES Revised by the Ninety-second KSDAR Conference March 17, 1990 Amended 1992, 1993, 1995, 1996,1997, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, and 2005

Number 1. The report of the Kansas Society shall be known as the Annual Report and Proceedings of the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The report shall be distributed by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, the number she desires; State Officers, 1 to 3 each; Chapters, 1 each; Honorary State Regents, 1 each; State Chairmen of National and State Committees, 1 each; Senior State President C.A.R., 1; District Directors, 1 each; the Library of the Kansas Society, 2; the Kansas Society DAR Archives in the Kansas DAR Library in Dodge City, Kansas, 1; the President General, NSDAR, 1; the Organizing Secretary General, 1; the National Parliamentarian, 1; and the Kansas State Historical Society, I. In an election year, one copy shall be given to each of the new officers and the chairmen of committees. Chapter Regents may receive a free copy by special request made before June 1. Except for State Officers, no one individual shall receive more than one free copy. Other members desiring copies may place by June 1 with the State Recording Secretary a prepaid order at the printing costs dollars per copy.

**Number 2.** At least two issues of the "Kansas DAR News" shall be printed each year and mailed to each member. The printing and mailing expenses shall be borne by the State Society.

**Number 3.** The sum of \$3,000 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.

**Number 4.** Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed each State Officer to partially defray her State Conference expenses.

**Number 5.** Forty dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent at Continental Congress; and forty dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent-elect; arrangements shall be made by the State Treasurer.

**Number 6.** Fifty dollars shall be allotted to the State Regent for Kansas Pages at Continental Congress.

Number 7. Funds budgeted for membership workshops shall be used for materials and photocopies for workshop packets and for the expense of workshop leaders for gasoline, turnpike tolls, and under special circumstances for lodging.

**Number 8.** Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the General Fund ten cents per chapter member for State Conference expenses. Any money remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

**Number 9.** Each chapter will pay \$2.00 per year toward the cost of Web hosting for the KSDAR Web site.

**Number 10.** Each year, on or before September 15, each chapter shall provide copies of its chapter yearbook to the State Officers, the Director of its District and the State Chairman of the Membership Committee.

Number 11. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, and Historian shall have the custody of the Kansas Society DAR Archives, which is located in the Kansas DAR Library in Dodge City, Kansas, and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent, and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

Number 12. The State Regent may send a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

**Number 13.** The State Regent shall have the State Regent's Pin appraised by the J.E. Caldwell Company once during her administration, and if the pin is lost, the State Society shall assume the cost of replacing it.

Number 14. The Kansas DAR Library shall be located in the lower level of the Village Square Mall, 2601 Central Avenue, in Dodge City, Kansas.

(a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Village Square Mall.

(b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee that shall be known as the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee to assume care of the library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of books, materials and equipment; shall assist the State Librarian when possible in the repair and maintenance of these items; and shall receive and answer all requests for the loan of books and other material.

(c) Annually by January I, \$300 shall be paid for Kansas DAR Library location expenses.

(d) Materials submitted to the Kansas DAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. To avoid duplication, donors shall check with the State Librarian before books are sent.

**Number 15.** An Endowment Fund for the support of the Kansas DAR Library has been established in order to ensure its future.

(a) Monies contributed to the Endowment Fund shall be under the jurisdiction of the State Treasurer.

(b) The annual interest accrued from the fund shall pay for the following

annual library expenses: rent, insurance, operating expenses, and purchase and maintenance of equipment.

**Number 16.** A Library Endowment Fund II shall be established for the purpose of expenses connected with the Kansas DAR Library facilities and hired staff; the earned interest of the Library Endowment Fund II Certificate of Deposit shall be added to the principle and shall remain in the Certificate of Deposit until needed.

Number 17. A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school senior who has DAR eligibility or to a member of DAR; proof of enrollment in a two or four-year accredited college or university shall be required.

**Number 18.** In the event that no applications are received for the scholarships offered during any year of the term, applications will be accepted for those scholarships the following year in addition to those regularly scheduled to be awarded.

**Number 19.** At the Conference Opening, the State Regent shall appoint a committee to approve the minutes of the State Conference.

Number 20. The hospitality of the following persons, if attending the State Conference at the official invitation of the State Regent, shall be a conference expense: Candidates for President General, NSDAR; National Officers or National Appointees appearing as speakers; two members of the National Board of Management; representatives of the DAR Schools, Approved Schools, and Indian Schools; or any designated speaker for a special program or event.

**Number 21.** (a) A \$10 limit shall be placed on awards at State Conference given by each committee chairman or state officer.

(b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust of \$750 shall pay monetary award at State Conference.

**Number 22.** The Kansas State Outstanding Junior shall be awarded \$150 if she attends Continental Congress, to be paid from the general fund.

Number 23. A national winner of the Good Citizens Contest, American History Essay Contest, Outstanding Junior Contest and V.A. Volunteer shall

be awarded \$250.00 toward transportation expenses to attend Continental Congress. The money awarded shall be from the general fund.

**Number 24.** The Kansas Society shall present to the State Regent an Ex-State Regent's Pin or, if she has been elected Honorary State Regent, an Honorary State Regent's Pin at the end of her term of office, providing that she has served two-thirds of her elected term. Shall be ordered by the State Treasurer and presented by the State Vice Regent.

**Number 25.** An Honorary State Regent who becomes a candidate for national office shall be extended the courtesy of one full-page, black-and-white advertisement in the *DAR Magazine*; donations from Districts, chapters, and individuals may be solicited, but the Kansas Society shall be responsible for any remaining balance of the expense of the advertisement to be paid from the general fund. The candidate shall be responsible for, and bear the expense of, the preparation of the advertisement for publication.

**Number 26.** The plan for the September Board of Management shall be made before March 1, by the State Regent and State Vice Regent, in consultation with the four District Directors. All plans for the tour shall be finalized by June 1.

Number 27. To assist with the facility expenses of the Kansas Society's September State Board of Management meeting, a sum not to exceed \$150, no more than one-half of the expense shall be allotted from the General Fund to the host chapter committee. The allotted sum shall be recommended by the State Vice Regent, with approval of the State Regent.

**Number 28.** A pilgrimage to a historically significant Kansas site may be held annually. Local chapters may act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed fifty dollars shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.

**Number 29.** A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book and/or a State Scrapbook. The book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

**Number 30.** An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings and other pertinent historical information shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings every ten years, beginning 1980.

**Number 31.** A Directory of members may be printed every ten years beginning in 1990. Interim supplements to the Directory may be issued.

Number 32. The chapters in each District are as follows:

SOUTHEAST - Cofachique, Council Oak, Emporia, Esther Lowrey, Four Winds, General Edward Hand, Isabella Weldin, Jane Dean Coffey, Marais des Cygnes, Molly Foster Berry, Neodesha, Oceanus Hopkins, Peleg Gorton, Susannah French Putney.

SOUTHWEST - Byrd Prewitt, Cimarron River Valley, Dodge City, Eunice Sterling, Flores del Sol, Fort Larned, Kanza, Little Arkansas, Little Osage Trail, Martha Loving Ferrell, Martha Vail, Newton, Randolph Loving, Uvedale, Wichita, William Wilson.

**Number 33.** The chapters of the hostess district for State Conference shall contribute an amount, set by the Executive Committee, not to exceed \$15.00. These monies are to be paid to the State Treasurer, to be used for decorations, table favors, hospitality and/or door prizes at the Annual State Conference. Surplus funds will be sent to the State General Fund.

**Number 34.** These Standing Rules may be amended at any State meeting by a majority vote and may be suspended for that meeting by a majority vote.
