Conference Rules

- 1. All members shall be registered before entering the business meetings. Proper identification badges shall be worn at all business meetings, with blue ribbon for delegates and red ribbon for alternates.
- 2. All meetings shall begin at the hour announced.
- Any business unfinished at the time of recess shall be resumed at the next business session.
- 4. No one is to be seated during reports, speeches, or musical numbers.
- 5. Only registered delegates and other voting members of the State Conference shall be entitled to make motions, debate, and vote. State Committee Chairmen and District Directors who are not elected delegates shall have the privilege to speak without vote.
- All main motions shall be written and signed by the maker and seconder and sent to the Recording Secretary before action is taken. The maker of the motion shall rise and state her name and that of her chapter.
- 7. All resolutions shall have been in the hands of the Resolutions Committee before the State Conference. The date shall have been determined and announced by the Resolutions Committee Chairman.
- No member shall speak in debate more than once to the same question on the same day, or longer than two minutes any time, except by the consent of the assembly.
- Members who appear on the program or who are making reports shall occupy the front seats. Accredited delegates to the State Conference shall occupy seats together at the front of the room at all business meetings.
- 10. Only the chair is to be addressed in making reports.
- 11. Two timekeepers shall be appointed by the chair. Reports of State Officers shall be limited to four minutes, and reports of Committee Chairmen, District Directors, and Chapter Regents to two minutes. The speakers shall conform with the ruling of the timekeepers.
- 12. Announcements must be submitted in writing to the State Recording Secretary. They will be approved by the State Regent and read from the podium.
- 13. A copy of every report for the printed Proceedings of the State Conference shall be submitted, ready for printing, and sent to the State Recording Secretary before the report is read at the Conference.
- 14. If the Officer, Chapter Regent or Chapter Vice Regent, Chairman or Appointee is not present, her report shall not be read and shall be filed for printing in the official Proceedings of the State Conference unless otherwise ordered.
- 15. Any Chairman or individual having a table display or exhibit shall attend to the removal of all material at the close of the Conference.
- 16. All necessary communications shall be delivered by the Pages.
- 17. Members shall have cell phones turned off or on vibrating ringer during business sessions, meals, and programs.
- 18. Members shall smoke only in designated areas.
- 19. Registration shall close at 11:00 a.m., Sunday, April 18, 2010.
- 20. The current edition of "Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised" will govern all parliamentary action not covered by the Society Bylaws and Rules.

Recommendations from the Executive Committee were read by Kathryn West, State Recording Secretary, who moved the adoption of each:

Recommendation 1. That the State Regent's Project of commemorating the centennial of KSDAR's marking of the Santa Fe Trail by restoring the Santa Fe Trail Markers in need of cleaning and re-lettering; be amended to encompass restoration of unspecified chapter Santa Fe Trail Markers; that restoration be defined as any improvements to the markers and foundations including re-location to a marker's original site; any associated fund-raising costs; the compiling and printing of a new survey of the markers which includes photographs, GPS locations, and other details of location, status, and history; and designation of remaining funds; be approved. Adopted (two-third vote).

Explanation: It has recently come to our attention that to be in compliance with IRS rules for non-profit funds, to safe guard the integrity of the Kansas Society, and to avoid any legal action, the original recommendation's verbiage restricts the fund's use only for cleaning and re-lettering the state markers. When the project was approved at the 2008 State Conference, it was almost unimaginable at that time that the project would be fully subscribed. If the full amount were raised, the intention was to celebrate the markers; publish another survey, which is widely anticipated; include chapter markers, especially the chapters who have designated their donation. It just wasn't spelled out in the original recommendation. In order to broaden the fund's use, it must be amended to specify additional usage.

Recommendation 2. That the amount of \$1,148.86 for the President General's Reception at the 2009 State Conference be ratified and be paid from the General Fund. Adopted.

Explanation: This was a thank you to the membership for their support of the President General's and State Regent's Projects. The overage was paid out of the State Regent's Project rather than further deplete general funds. However, due to the restriction of the State Regent's Project recommendation approved at the 2008 State Conference, which we were not aware of until recently, the overage must be paid out of general funds.

Ms. Hurt, State Treasurer addressed the Board of Management, and indicated that the 2009 Books were closed and the adjustments would be made to the current year with notification to the audit committee.

Recommendation 3: That the amount of \$1,170.00 for two additional pages in the September 2009 DAR Magazine be ratified and be paid from the General Fund. Adopted.

Explanation: This was a thank you for the support received from the Santa Fe Trail Association and Suhor Industries for State Regent's Project. It

also provided national publicity for the project. The pages were paid out of the State Regent's Project rather than further deplete general funds. However, due to the restriction of the State Regent's Project recommendation approved at the 2008 State Conference, which we were not aware of until recently, the pages must be paid for out of general funds.

Recommendation 4: That the expenditure of \$1,637.37 for computer and peripherals upgrades at the Kansas DAR Library with appropriate office and security software, be ratified. The amount of \$1,637.37 shall come from Library I CD. Adopted.

Explanation: The computer used by the Library was over six years old and was not capable of supporting new operating system software; security software or peripherals. Peripherals include HP all-in-one printer, desk chair, cart, and ink cartridges. The Library staff couldn't access the Internet for helpful genealogical sites nor scan documents to be emailed when requested, saving postage. This also gives them the capability to provide individual help with GRS files and navigating the state and national websites.

Recommendation 5: That the amounts of \$126.00 and \$136.00 for the purchase of three pins for the Outstanding Chapter Regent and three pins for the Outstanding Junior, be ratified. These pins will be for use through 2013, and therefore will not be budgeted during the next administration. <u>Adopted.</u>

Explanation: There was concern about the viability of J.E. Caldwell, and as a result, pins were purchased to cover the next three years.

Mrs. Hurt, Chairman, Finance Committee, reviewed the 2010 Proposed Budget. Ms. Hurt and Ms. Coupal answered questions.

Alice Walker moved to return the budget back to committee to return proposed budget during the 112th State Conference. Seconded. Adopted.

Ms. Coupal asked if any new business should be addressed.

Ms. Coupal announced that the consideration for proposed amendments to the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution and would begin during the morning of Saturday, April 17, 2010.

Ms. Coupal reminded the assembled that all members shall be registered before entering the business meetings, and that proper identification is to be worn at all times. Delegates will be identified with blue ribbons and alternates with red ribbons.

The Opening Business Session of the State Conference will begin immediately following the adjournment of the Spring Board of Management. Ms. Coupal announced the Kansas DAR Store would be open between sessions and supports the State Regent's project and that the Junior General Store would also be open between business sessions.

Ms. Coupal noted that a representative from J. E. Caldwell was available and had a table in the foyer.

Ms. Coupal thanked all for attending the Board of Management meeting.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned without objection at 2:22 p.m.

- Mrs. Camacho, by direction of the Bylaws Committee moved the adoption of the following proposed Amendment 3, Terminology – Budget, which includes Amendments 3A and 3B, to be voted as a block.
 - Amendment 3A: Budget State Board of Management. Amend Article IX, State Board of Management, Section 5, Duties, Paragraph 4, by striking out "budget" and inserting in its place "spending guidelines." If adopted, Paragraph 4 would read: It shall approve the spending guidelines submitted by the Finance Committee, shall ratify any transfer of funds by the State Treasurer, and shall consider any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society.

Amendment 3B: Budget – Finance Committee. Amend Article XI, Committees, Section 5, Finance Committee, Paragraph 1, Sentences 2 and 3, by substituting "It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to prepare the annual spending guidelines to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The recommended spending guidelines shall be submitted to the State Conference for action."

After discussion, Ms. Coupal called for the block vote on Amendment 3, which includes Amendments 3A and 3B in the block. <u>Not Adopted.</u>

Amendment 5A: Finance Committee – Composition. Amend Article XI, Committees, Section 5, Finance Committee, Paragraph 1, Sentence 1, by substituting "The Finance Committee shall be composed of the State Treasurer, the State Recording Secretary, and two members appointed by the State Regent. The State Regent shall designate one of these members other than the State Treasurer to serve as Chairman."

Amendment 5B: Duties – State Treasurer. Amend Article VII, Duties of Officers, Section 8, State Treasurer, Paragraph 5, by striking out "the chairman" and inserting in its place "a member." If adopted, Paragraph 4 would read: "She shall serve as a member of the Finance Committee (See Article XI, Section 5.)"

After debate, Ms. Coupal called for the block vote on Amendment 5, which includes Amendments 5A and 5B in the block. Not Adopted.

6. Mrs. Camacho, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, moved the adoption of the following proposed Amendment 6, Standing Committees – KSDAR Scholarship Committee.

Amendment 6. Amend Article XI, Committees, Section 7, Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee, Paragraph 1, Sentence 3, by inserting "and the Kansas DAR Good Citizen Scholarship" after "Kansas DAR Scholarship." If adopted, Sentence 3 will read "Funds for the Kansas DAR Scholarship

- and the Kansas DAR Good Citizens Scholarship are provided from interest on designated investments. Adopted.
- 7. Mrs. Camacho, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, moved the adoption of following proposed Amendment 7, Standing Committees Resolutions Committee.
 - Amendment 7. Amend Article XI, Committees, Section 8, Resolutions Committee, by substituting "The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. The courtesy resolution shall be prepared and presented by the Resolutions Committee. Adopted.
- 8. Mrs. Camacho, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, moved the adoption of the following proposed Amendment 8, Standing Committees Reports.
 - Amendment 8. Amend Article XI Committees, Section 13, Reports, Paragraph 1, Sentence 3, by striking out Sentence 3: "The oral reports cannot be given if the written report is not on file."

After discussion, Ms. Coupal called for the vote on Amendment 8. Adopted.

- 9. Mrs. Camacho, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, moved the adoption of the following proposed Amendment 9, which are moved as a block, as Amendment 9A, Establishment of Long Range Planning Commission, with attached provisos, and Amendment 9B Long Range Planning Committee Appointment Exception.
 - Amendment 9A. Establishment of Long Range Planning Commission. Provisos.
 - That in order to establish the Long Range Planning Committee, five members be appointed during the 2010-2013 administration. At the beginning of the 2013-2016 administration, two more members shall be added. At the beginning of the 2016-2019 administration, two more members shall be added, and two shall retire.
 - 2. The initial appointees shall be an exception to the requirement that limits service to no more than six years.
 - 3. Should a vacancy occur in the initially appointed chairman before three years have elapsed, an exception to the three-year requirement shall be made in the appointment of the chairman who fills the balance of the unexpired term.

Amend Article XI, Committees, by adding a new Section 15, Long Range Planning Commission. "Section 15. The Long Range Planning Commission shall consist of 5 members, each of whom shall serve no more than six years.

At the beginning of a new administration the State Regent, with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint 2 new

members to the Commission, with the 2 members completing the longest term retiring.

Should a vacancy occur in the membership of the Commission, the State Regent, with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint a new member to the Commission, whose appointment shall expire at the time of the member that she is replacing.

The State Regent shall appoint a chairman of the Commission from the 5 members already serving. Should a vacancy occur in this chairmanship, the State Regent shall appoint a new chairman to serve the balance of the unexpired term. This chairman shall also be named from those who have completed at least three years on the Commission.

Any member who misses two consecutive meetings of the Commission without just cause shall automatically be retired from the Commission. The State Regent, with the approval of the Executive Committee, shall appoint a replacement to fill the unexpired term.

The purpose of the Commission, which shall transcend from one administration to the next, is to strengthen the viability of the Kansas Society by providing continuing assessment of its future needs and to ensure stability in the transition process.

The duties of the Commission shall be to monitor the progress of the Kansas Society, endeavor to identify its future needs, investigate courses of action by which those needs may be accomplished, and make recommendations to the Executive Committee.

The Commission shall report to the Executive Committee."

After discussion, Ms. Coupal called for the vote on Amendment 9A. <u>Not Adopted.</u>

Mrs. Camacho, on behalf of the Bylaws Committee, requested permission to withdraw the related Amendment 9B – Long Range Planning Commission – Appointment Exception.

Ms. Coupal, hearing no objection, stated that Amendment 9B is withdrawn.

 Mrs. Camacho, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, moved the adoption of the following proposed Amendment 10, Jurisdiction – District Finances.

Amendment 10. Amend Article XII, Districts, Section 2, Jurisdiction, by adding a new paragraph 2 "District officers shall be responsible for complying with NSDAR directives in regard to their District's finances. (See Article VII, Section 8, Paragraph 10.)" Adopted.

Amendment 11: Amend Article XII, Districts, Section 4, Officers, Sentence 2, by striking out "Chapter Regents' banquet at" after "assume the duties of their office" and inserting in its place "State Conference at which the State Officers are elected." If adopted, Sentence 2 would read "Officers shall be elected for a term of three years at the Annual District Meeting preceding the election of the State Officers and shall assume the duties of their office at the close of the State Conference at which the State Officers are elected. Adopted.

 Mrs. Camacho, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, moved the adoption of the following proposed Amendment 12, Duties – Chapter Regent.

A chapter may elect such additional officers as it deems necessary and is authorized to adopt bylaws and rules for the transaction of business provided that they do not conflict with the Bylaws of the National Society or of the state organization. (NSDAR Bylaws, Article XIII, Chapters, Section 6 (d))." Adopted.

28. Mrs. Camacho, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, moved the adoption of the following proposed Amendment 28, State Conference Pages.

Amendment 28: Amend Standing Rules by adding a new standing rule to be inserted after Standing Rule Number 22 and renumbering remaining Standing Rules: "Number 23. The Registration Fee shall be waived for members serving as State Conference Pages." <u>Adopted.</u>

Ms. Coupal noted that amendments to the Standing Rules were complete.

Mrs. Camacho, on behalf of the Bylaws Committee, moved that the State Recording Secretary, in consultation with the Bylaws Committee and the State Parliamentarian, be authorized to correct article and section designations, punctuation, and cross-references and to make such other technical and conforming changes as may be necessary to reflect the intent of the Society in connection with the printing of the amended Bylaws of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution in the 2010 edition of the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings. Adopted.

Ms. Coupal expressed appreciation to the Bylaws Committee Chairman, Mary Camacho and to the members of the committee, Betty McGehee, Karen Buhler, Barbara Dew, and Jane Hursh, as well as to State Parliamentarian, Luke Ottaway, for her advice and assistance with formatting; to Margaret Bates for posting a copy of the Proposed Amendments on the KSDAR Web Site and providing electronic notification; to Patricia Carpenter for putting notification in the CyberSunflower; and to the delegates for their patience throughout this very long process and their thoughtful consideration of the amendments.

Mrs. Hurt, State Treasurer, reported that the \$1,773.00 in donations were received during the luncheon today to support the Hindman School.

Brenda Dooley moved to add an amount from the state General Fund to the check for Hindman School to make an even \$1,800.00. Seconded. Adopted.

The third report of the credentials committee was submitted by Jean Lightner, Credentials Chairman:

Mrs. Lightner, by the direction of the Credentials Committee, moved that the revised roll of delegates hereby submitted be the official roll of the voting members of the One Hundred Twelfth Annual State Conference. Adopted.

Kathryn West, State Recording Secretary, by the direction of the State Board of Management, moved the adoption of the following recommendations:

Recommendation 1. That the amount of \$427.52 for the expense of printing and postage of Bylaws be ratified. <u>Adopted.</u>

Explanation: These costs are above our normal printing and postage charges.

Recommendation 2. That the State Regent's Project of commemorating the centennial of KSDAR's marking of the Santa Fe Trail by restoring the Santa Fe Trail Markers in need of cleaning and re-lettering; be amended to encompass restoration of unspecified chapter Santa Fe Trail Markers; that restoration be defined as any improvements to the markers and foundations including re-location to a marker's original site; any associated fund-raising costs; the compiling and printing of a new survey of the markers which includes photographs, GPS locations, and other details of location, status, and history; and designation of remaining funds; be approved. Adopted (two-third vote).

Explanation: It has recently come to our attention that to be in compliance with IRS rules for non-profit funds, to safe guard the integrity of the Kansas Society, and to avoid any legal action, the original recommendation's verbiage restricts the fund's use only for cleaning and re-lettering the state markers. When the project was approved at the 2008 State Conference, it was almost unimaginable at that time that the project would be fully subscribed. If the full amount was raised, the intention was to celebrate the markers; publish another survey, which is widely anticipated; include chapter markers, especially the chapters who have designated their donation. It just wasn't spelled out in the original recommendation. In order to broaden the fund's use, it must be amended to specify additional usage.

Recommendation 3. That the amount of \$1,148.86 for the President General's Reception at the 2009 State Conference be ratified and be paid from the General Fund. Adopted.

Explanation: This was a thank you to the membership for their support of the President General's and State Regent's Projects. The overage was paid out of the State Regent's Project rather than further deplete general funds. However, due to the restriction of the State Regent's Project recommendation approved at the 2008 State Conference, which we were not aware of until recently, the overage must be paid out of general funds.

Recommendation 4. That the amount of \$1,170.00 for two additional pages in the September 2009 DAR Magazine be ratified and be paid from the General Fund. Adopted.

Explanation: This was a thank you for the support received from the Santa Fe Trail Association and Suhor Industries for State Regent's Project. It also provided national publicity for the project. The pages were paid out of the State Regent's Project rather than further deplete general funds. However, due to the restriction of the State Regent's Project recommendation approved at

the 2008 State Conference, which we were not aware of until recently, the pages must be paid for out of general funds.

Recommendation 5. That the expenditure of \$1,637.37 for computer and peripherals upgrades at the Kansas DAR Library with appropriate office and security software, be ratified. The amount of \$1,637.37 shall come from Library I CD. Adopted.

Explanation: The computer used by the Library was over six years old and was not capable of supporting new operating system software; security software or peripherals. Peripherals include HP all-in-one printer, desk chair, cart, and ink cartridges. The Library staff couldn't access the Internet for helpful genealogical sites nor scan documents to be emailed when requested, saving postage. This also gives them the capability to provide individual help with GRS files and navigating the state and national websites.

Recommendation 6: That the amounts of \$126.00 and \$136.00 for the purchase of three pins for the Outstanding Chapter Regent and three pins for the Outstanding Junior, be ratified. These pins will be for use through 2013, and therefore will not be budgeted during the next administration. <u>Adopted.</u>

Explanation: There was concern about the viability of J.E. Caldwell, and as a result, pins were purchased to cover the next three years.

Jane Hurt, State Treasurer, presented the audit committee while the Pages passed out the Balance Sheet and the Profit & Loss Statement. Audit committee members Patricia Carpenter, Alice Walker, and Marti Wright were recognized.

Mrs. Hurt presented the financial report. Special notes were made regarding two CD withdrawals.

The withdrawal of \$3,500.00 from the Library 1 CD which was deposited into a money market fund for the purchase of a new computer and peripherals for the KSDAR Library. After the purchase, the balance of the transferred amount, or \$1,951.97, was deposited into a CD, Library 1 A, as the timing would not allow it to be placed back into the Library 1 CD.

The Marker Preservation Fund CD was redeemed in September 2008 and \$5,723.72 was put into a money-market fund in case it was needed for the marker preservation. These funds were not used and therefore have been redeposited into a CD.

Questions were answered.

Ms. Coupal referred the financial statement to the Audit Committee.

Patricia Carpenter, Audit Committee Chairman, presented the report of the Audit Committee and moved the acceptance of the 2009 Report of the Audit Committee. Adopted.

Ms. Coupal indicated that corrective action had been taken and requested that the State Treasurer make the appropriate adjustments to the books and further, requested a revised audit committee report.

Ms. Coupal called for the report of the State Officers.

Given the present hour, Ms. Coupal indicated that her report will be filed, as did the State Vice Regent, State Chaplain, State Recording Secretary, State Corresponding Secretary, State Organizing Secretary, and State Treasurer.

Mrs. Dooley, State Registrar, reported.

The reports of the State Historian, State Librarian, and State Reporter were filed.

Without objection, Ms. Coupal asked that the reports of State Chairmen be filed.

Ms. Coupal thanked those reporting for their dedicated work during the "At Home on the Plains" administration.

Alice Bachand made an announcement concerning the Help Us Learn, Give Us Hope project.

The meeting was recessed at 4:45 p.m.

This State Regent wishes to thank everyone who has supported this administration, the restoration of the Santa Fe Trail DAR markers, the computerization of forms and the master questionnaire, and the updating of the bylaws. It is the future and it is now. If we are to grow, attract new members, create interest in our organization in the next generation, we must change from how it has always been to how it is going to be. A sign of the times is the decline of printed newspapers and the number of papers going exclusively to online. The Generation Y's aren't looking for a piece of paper to read, they are looking online. NSDAR, seeing the writing on the wall, has embraced social media and KSDAR must too. Chapter Regents without email and an internet connection are limiting themselves and hampering their chapter from attracting new members and growing. The Chapter Regents, who have accepted and adapted to the changes, have expressed their appreciation.

The State Regent's Project to restore the Santa Fe Trail DAR markers through Kansas has been fully subscribed. The restoration will be completed by June 2010, in time to celebrate all the effort, time, and money contributed to this very popular project. Kansas Daughters love their Kansas history and it has certainly been shown in the support of this project. Celebrations will be held at Lone Elm, Olathe; Council Oak, Council Grove; Stone Corral, Lyons and Fort Larned, Larned; and Point of Rocks, Elkhart, on Saturdays during June. A special event with the Santa Fe Trail Association at the Santa Fe Trail Center, Larned, will be included. Reports on the restored markers state they are beautiful. Along with whatever work was deemed necessary to restore the markers, they have been sealed which should protect the work for many years. There aren't enough ways to say thank you to everyone that has supported and contributed

to this project. Please join us at one of the locations to give yourself a pat on the back.

The Real Daughters have surfaced. At the October Board, it was announced that the Historian General's Office would be publishing a new book on the DAR's Real Daughters. The Real Daughters' graves in Kansas had not been checked since the Kansas Centennial Administration. The Captain Jesse Leavenworth Chapter had rededicated the grave stone and plaque of Frances Loveland at Soldier, KS. Recently, the General Edward Hand Chapter undertook restoring the stone of Terressa Hoyt at Lebo. This past October they rededicated the marker and viewed the reset stone. Between October 10th and 31st, 2009, this officer checked and photographed all of the Real Daughter graves in Kansas. Kansas has six Real Daughters, five buried in Kansas and one in Ohio. In addition, we have two Real Daughters who belonged to chapters in other states. All the grave stones in Kansas are in fine condition. With the exception of one missing plaque, all are suitably marked. Lucy Estabrook's Real Daughter plaque is gone. We are in the process of having it replaced. The Betty Washington Chapter marked her grave in 1925. The information on file in the Historian General's Office says she was a member-at-large when she passed away. Shari Johnson and Nancy Jaeger have been instrumental in proving this incorrect, tracking down her living relatives, and being the boots on the ground in Lawrence. Due to their efforts, the Betty Washington Chapter has taken over the remarking of Mrs. Estabrooks' grave. The Historian General's Office has all the paper work and it will be six-eight months before it is approved.

This State Regent believes in change, challenges, and trying to do the right thing. She has always listened to a different drummer and followed the path less traveled. This can lead to some interesting consequences, but no dull moments.

It seems to be a long tradition for the State Regent to report every stop she has made during the year. This State Regent always felt this was the expected part of the job and chose to report on aspirations and actual accomplishments rather than where she'd been. Her calendar is online and in the proceedings. As of April 21, 2010 she will have visited all the chapters at least once.

She has spoken endlessly on the Santa Fe Trail DAR Markers, their restoration, various plans to celebrate that restoration, and to publish a new marker survey. The application for, and granting of, a National Park Service (NPS) Challenge Cost Share Grant (CCSG),has been reported and is documented in the state as well as the national proceedings. Apparently missed by some, recent questions arose about the appropriateness of receiving a grant and even the appropriateness of the work being done. Finally it was revealed that any work beyond the cleaning and re-lettering was not in the spirit of the recommendation passed at the 2008 State Conference. The timing is suspect,

hence, the re-vote and re-classification of funds on the advice of accountants outside of the organization, but familiar with non-profit organizations. This was not handled as it should have been by all involved.

It was this officer's assumption and many others, as well, that the State Regent's Project funds could be used for related project activities. Contracts have to be honored. The NPS grant has been paid out and they require a report, consequently, the need for a published survey of the markers. It is a huge feather in our cap to have been granted a CCSG. The NPS doesn't give the money outright to our kind of organization but gives it to one of their cooperative historic trail partners to administer, in our case to the Santa Fe Trail Association. This is to our advantage. We receive the benefits without the book keeping.

It is obvious that our accounting practices are in need of overhauling. Restricted funds should be kept separate from general or unrestricted funds. The State Regent's Project funds must not be deposited into general checking as they have been. They must be held separately, so they are readily identified as such on our financial report. Defining the details of a State Regent's Project will be a necessity to keep the use of those funds legal. This is all very complicated to keep track of by a service organization made up of volunteers without the resources to hire outside help.

The bylaws will be left in better and more useful shape than they were found. Even though some amendments will be rejected, eventually their foresightedness will be recognized as needing to be addressed. Almost all the current and future state officers work in some capacity and to keep the 40 and younger members interested, we must move ahead with alternate forms of communication. Publishing and postage expenses are too high not to actively pursue electronic methods.

We have accomplished many of our goals: developed an advisor system to support the state chairmen; involved more chapter members on the state level; provided orientation workshops and educational tools for chapter officers and state chairmen; redesigned the members-only website to include everything a busy chapter regent needs; improved that State Information Packet (SIP); utilized The Cyber Sunflower as the monthly newsletter; increased attendance at the fall meeting; found a centralized, state of the art facility for State Conference; evaluated our computer hardware and software needs; assessed the needs of the State Treasurer's office; exceeded the President General's Project assessment; fully subscribed the State Regent's Project; fifty-seven of fifty-nine chapter regents have email, another chapter officer in the other two chapters are the electronic contacts; all state chairmen have email; allowed development and promoted the electronic Master Questionnaire; decreased the number of dropped members; held application workshops; and increased membership in at least two at-risk chapters.

Before we pass our stewardship to the next administration, we must stabilize our financial situation. As a result of declining membership and non-existent interest rates, we have run a deficit budget for over five years. With over \$189,000 in assets, raising dues may not seem necessary, but the deficit grows and income declines. This has been masked, largely due to the Cope and Coupal State Regent Projects' income. This is another reason our accounting practices of restricted funds should be changed. Our \$3.50 dues do not cover our fixed expenses, maintenance of the library, scholarships, or the mandated standing rule expenses. A survey of 25 state regents revealed that most state dues are in the \$10 range.

This administration has cut copying and postage costs. We have used email extensively to expedite real time communications. A cost savings was realized in switching printers for the Annual Proceedings. The State Officers have declined to turn in their expenses. We have made better use of the printed KSDAR News and expanded the online version. But more needs to be done to cut the cost of the newsletter and the Annual Proceedings, together they represent \$4,000 expenditure.

We made the decision to standardize the computers' and peripherals' amortizations so that future state officers would not have to provide their own equipment. Nor would the generosity of members to provide programs such as Adobe Acrobat 8 Professional be needed. In order to do this, we spent a few thousand dollars but only after comparison shopping for the best prices. The HP laptops purchased with the appropriate security and office software replaced the six plus year old desktop computers. None of the desktops had been purchased with security software and had never been updated which greatly limited their usefulness. With appropriate care and updates, the laptops should be in use much longer and can be passed on to other officers. This officer's laptop gave her the flexibility of presenting the need for restoring the Santa Fe Trail DAR markers through a power point presentation and working while traveling.

In closing, this officer wants to thank everyone who contributed to the success of this administration especially her family, mentors, special friends, state officers and chairmen, chapter regents, and district officers.

Nothing is really ended until it is forgotten. Whatever is kept in memory still endures.

STATE VICE REGENT Anne Barbour

This officer attended all meetings and activities as required of her office as well as Continental Congress in July. At Fall Meeting in Salina September 11-12 2009, she distributed chapter chairman changes to State Committee Chairs. She designated tables for the Chairmen for the Committee Fair. In recognition of Bells Across America, she rang bells on September 17 for Constitution Week. She attended Naturalization Ceremony at Federal Courthouse in Kansas City Kansas on September 25 and led the new citizens in the Pledge to the American Flag. She was privileged to attend the 25th anniversary celebration of the Little Arkansas DAR chapter on October 23 and the 60th anniversary of the Shawnee Mission Chapter DAR on November 14. She worked with Dewey Fry, Delaware Crossing SAR, in assembling DAR addresses for invitations to the George Washington Birthday event. She has signed contract for Golden West Tea to be in July 2010 and sent to J W Marriott. She has been in communication with Jean Coupal-Smith and Patricia Unruh regarding table favors and centerpieces for that event. Invitations have been sent to all National Officers, State Regents and the Honorary Vice Presidents General of Kansas and Arizona.

Twelve ladies were honored at State Conference with certificates for 50 years of membership in the Daughters of the American Revolution. Janet Denton Hinther of the John Athey Chapter; Henrietta Lee Olson of the Wyandot Chapter; Thelma Zarker Harper of the Topeka Chapter; Gladys Brewer of the Newton Chapter and Lola F. Ashwill of the Shawnee Mission Chapter were honored for being the oldest members of the Kansas State Society. Fifty-nine chapters reported representing 2,689 members. Chapters reported 109 programs or projects in American Heritage Cultural Events and Traditions. Among the outstanding programs were "Canning and Preserving the Fruits of Labor" presented at a nursing home where the chapter celebrated a member's 95th birthday, a program on Women's Antique Underwear, and "As American as Apple Pie." Eight chapters reported entries for the American Heritage contests which consisted of eight entries for Fiber Arts, including embroidery, crochet, machine-quilted and hand-quilted quilt, table runner and hanging, and waxed linen cord weaving; one entry for Crafts; four entries for Arts and Sculpture; one entry for Literature and Drama; and two entries for Cultural Events and Traditions which included one individual entry and one chapter entry. For the first time, Kansas had participants in the Quilters' S.O.S. (Save Our Stories Quilters' Oral History Project) with two chapters reporting. Chapters also reported that Kansas daughters donated time and money to community cultural events, museums and historical societies.

This committee had 100% reporting with 51 chapters participating in some type of American History Activity. The following information was

reported: American History Programs - 189 given at chapter meetings or to other groups, forty-four programs about Outstanding American Women, eightthree Women in American History were honored, and two Women in American History Certificates were awarded. Programs were varied and covered issues such as historical penmanship, historic homes, the National Anthem, past Chapter Regents, and African or Native American patriots. Some chapters devoted a portion of each meeting to Women in American History and a Historical tidbit. One chapter used opening prayers used by former Presidents of the United States. Two members from Cimarron Valley were outstanding volunteers in preserving history in their part of the state. Sixty-nine displays were used by chapters to publicize American History, spot announcements were used 210 times with chapters utilizing 230 minutes of radio or television time and 330 press inches. Fourteen schools participated in the essay contest, nine being public, four being private and twelve students being home schooled. 287 students participated with 218 certificates of participation being awarded. Thirty-seven certificates of award and twenty-three bronze medals were awarded. In the Christopher Columbus essay, two public schools participated with two students receiving certificates. 111 certificates were given for American History Awards.

KSDAR Librarian, Barbara Dale, and State DAR Project Patriot Chairman, Mary Ellen Norris, joined this committee chairman to witness the Constitution Week Proclamation Signing Ceremony by the Governor of Kansas. Mark Parkinson. Forty-one additional proclamations were issued by local governments or schools by twenty-seven chapters. Forty chapters reported reciting the Preamble to the Constitution or reading a Constitution sidelight at chapter meetings. Thirty-three chapters organized "Bells Across America" events. One hundred twenty-five displays were placed in schools, libraries, churches, and store windows. Spot announcements written by NSDAR were sent to schools to be read over the intercom system, radio stations, and local television channels. Eighty-five events were sponsored by fifty-two chapters. Memorable programs included: playing games to reinforce knowledge of the Constitution; inviting local lawyers to speak on a selected amendment; presenting an original program about the National Convention during which the Constitution was drafted; creating a chapter Constitution Week Scrapbook to be sent in to be judged at state, district, and national levels; purchasing books that explain the Constitution to youthful readers which are donated to schools or libraries, and serving refreshments and presenting instructional materials to newly naturalized citizens of the United States.

DAR GOOD CITIZEN Stacy Cope

Kansas Chapters honored 75 high school seniors with the DAR Good Citizen Award this year, which included 61 who participated in the essay contest. 27 essays were forwarded to the State Chairman. The winner receives a \$1,000 scholarship (\$750 from KSDAR and \$250 from NSDAR), framed certificate and pin. The Shawnee Mission Chapter sponsored the state winner, Mary Raeana Preziosa Rometti. 38 Kansas Chapters participated in the program. 121 Kansas High Schools were contacted, 4 schools participated for the first time. Winners and their families were honored at luncheons, teas or meetings. Several high schools presented the DAR Good Citizen Awards during an assembly at the school attended by the Chapter Regent and/or the Chapter Chairman. Kansas daughters have once again made this chairman very proud. Fifty-nine chapters reported including 886 youth in their flag related activities. Twenty-nine chapters had Flag Events or programs totaling 66 in all, with Cimmaron River Valley Chapter hosting twelve of those events. Over 900 flags were donated and 28 Flag Certificates were presented to worthy recipients. The number of flag codes distributed was 3489...an increase from last year. The report of the membership committee is done by calendar year. The committee had 100% reporting with all 59 chapters participating. Thirty nine chapters used the Prospective Member Database and discussed it with members at their meetings. Pat Svaty, co-chairman, kept a strict account of all referrals to the chapters and followed up with the progress of these referrals. Many chapters were able to increase their membership with Pat's help and the referrals. Of course, this is an ongoing process. KSDAR had 130 new members by application. Sixty eight members deceased, 19 members dropped for non-payment of dues, 73 resignations, 13 re-instatements. Of 20 transfers out, 14 left the state of Kansas. Of 22 transfers in, 16 were new to the state of Kansas. Numerous workshops were done. Numerous application papers were researched and typed on behalf of chapters who requested assistance with the application process. Current membership as of January 1, 2010 stands at 2689.

NATIONAL DEFENSE

Threats to our liberties continue around the world and our nation is responding by standing up for the freedoms we enjoy. Fifty-four Kansas DAR chapters devoted at least three minutes to reading from the "National

The Seimes Technology Centers current focus is to disseminate information to DAR members and researchers. The Center is located on the First floor of Memorial Continental Hall with the DAR Library. Primary source documents, digitalized copies of DAR papers, census and revolutionary war records are found there. The Center makes copies of genealogical records on microfilm, microfiche and CD-Rom available to Library staff, DAR members and the public. The major emphasis of the Center is fund raising to support the online database subscriptions and site licenses. Chapter contributions are used to maintain equipment at headquarters, film DAR records and purchase research collections. Five hundred twenty-six members donated \$503.68 to

The State Regent's Project of the restoration of the Santa Fe Trail Markers in Kansas is nearing completion. A comprehensive survey of all markers will soon be updated once the necessary restoration is completed. Frequent updates are submitted to WAGON TRACKS, the publication of the SFTA. Other funding to complete the project has been raised from the KSDAR membership and other interested entities. This chairman wishes to acknowledge the incredible efforts of all KSDAR members who have fully subscribed and supported this most significant project. Restoration of the markers began in early summer 2009, and is nearing completion. The State Regent has planned five celebrations during the month of June 2010, each celebrating the restoration of a marker in each of the four districts of KSDAR, and a special celebration of the marker in Larned, KS. We will welcome each member to attend, where you may view the work completed, meet members of Santa Fe Trail Association, the National Park Service, and other interested community officials and persons. STATE REGENT'S PROJECT – EL CUARTELEJO

Sammy Cope

What has happened with El Cuartelejo since the Centennial History was completed by Pat Traffas and Shirley Coupal as we spiral ahead into the Second Century of DAR in the great state of Kansas? The story of the vital role in the history of Kansas is detailed in the above mentioned KSDAR History, is chronicled in the Kansas Heritage magazine (Spring, 2006) and in the Kansas Wildlife and Parks magazine (September, 2009). This site is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and it is also holds the rarefied status of a National Landmark. In the fall of 2000, Alice Walker, State Regent and the Kansas Daughters had a pilgrimage to visit the ruins and area of El Cuartelejo. Peggy Boggs, State Historian, gave a brief history of the area and its importance. Sammy Cope, State Regent, 2004-2007, announced her state project as some restoration on the El Cuartelejo property. Mr. Tom Witty, Jr., retired Kansas State Archeologist, spoke at the State Conference banquet on "El Cuartelejo – Then and Now". He spoke of the excavations at the site and gave a glimpse into the need for preservation of the past and the dream of future improvements. Mrs. Cope and the State Historian traveled to Scott State Park and met representatives of the Park Service and discussed the

immediate needs and plans for the ruins and site and the need for an interpretative center. This activity netted the Outstanding American Indian State Activity award at NSDAR. Mrs. Cope traveled the state during her tenure as State Regent and told the story of El Cuarteleio to establish awareness of its historic significance and to raise funds for the Project. Through the generosity of many buying dream-catcher pins, donations, fund raising events, we collected almost \$25,000 for the project to use for the future of El Cuartelejo. As meetings continued with the Historical Committees and the Wildlife and Parks Divisions it was decided that a survey should be made so a future building site would be properly located. That's when we hit a major BOULDER, the survey with modern surveying techniques showed that the ruins were not on the property that had been deeded to the DAR. DAR paid for a second survey, but it did not resolve the problem. As history certainly tells us, the Steeles intended the DAR to have the ruins to protect. Our attorney wrote the governor regarding the problem. Due to the political turmoil with our governor going to Washington and a new governor this problem has been shelved for the time being. It should be remembered that in March 2007 that the State Conference passed a Recommendation to transfer the El Cuartelejo pueblo property to the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks to build an interpretative center and preserve the ruins with some protective covenants. The motion was adopted. Daughters had realized that the care of a facility was more that we could handle. Meantime much new improvement has been made in the park proper and the El Cuartelejo area and certainly more publicity has evolved.

Standing Rules

Standing Rule Number 1

The State Regent makes all plans for the State Board of Management Meeting, which is a State Society function. She arranges for the flags, pianist, etc., and for the seating in the room.

- a. The District Director and hostess chapter cooperate by providing a suitable meeting place for the meeting and by having refreshments, such as coffee and sweet breads or cookies, available for the board members when they arrive.
- b. The District Meeting is a separate meeting. The District Director plans the program. It is her privilege to plan the seating, to arrange for a pianist and for an invocation, if she wishes to have these, and to arrange for a flag or flags in the event the State Society flags are not available.

Standing Rule Number 3

- a. Record the minutes of the meeting and send a copy to the District Director for approval.
- b. Send an annual District Report, including all election results, to the State Regent and State Recording Secretary to be included in the Annual Report and Proceedings.
- Oversee all District financial matters.
- d. Submit a financial statement to the State Treasurer by May 31.
- e. Assist in any capacity requested.

AMENDMENTS

The Southeast District Guidelines may be amended by majority vote of those present at the Annual Meeting, provided that they do not conflict with the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution bylaws or Standing Rules or the Bylaws of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution and provided that any such amendment has been submitted to the Southeast District Chapters, District Officers and State Regent, thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting.

Standing Rules

The annual meeting shall be held on the same day and in the same place as the Kansas State Fall Meeting.

STATE OFFICERS CLUB

A motion was adopted to retire the gooney bird, sea gull and broken white sign. By unanimous consent of the members, the broken red bird will become property of the State Regent. Jacqualine Dunham, Nominating Committee Chairman, presented the slate of nominees: Brenda Dooley, President; Rebecca Kline, First Vice President; Elaine Oakleaf, Second Vice President; Susan Metzger, Third Vice President; Margaret Huffman, Chaplain; Kathryn West, Secretary; Colleen Anderson, Treasurer; unfilled, Reporter. The slate was adopted with the Reporter position remaining unfilled. The Chaplain installed the new officers. A motion was adopted to donate \$200.00 to Help Us Learn...Give Us Hope. The meeting was adjourned. Members enjoyed the dessert bar and visiting.

KSDAR STATE OFFICERS' CLUB GUIDELINES (Adopted March 2004)

ARTICLE I - Name

The name of the club shall be the Kansas Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, State Officers' Club.

ARTICLE II – Object

The object of this club shall be to foster sociability and friendship among the members and to promote the interests of the National and Kansas Societies of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II – Members

Section 1. Those eligible for membership shall be the current and past state officers of the Kansas Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who are members in good standing.

Section 2. Newly elected officers shall be eligible for membership at the first annual meeting following the installation of the incoming state regent at Continental Congress.

ARTICLE IV - Fees and Dues

Section 1. The initiation fee for new members shall be five dollars (\$5.00).

Section 2. The annual dues shall be one dollar (\$1.00) per member, payable at or before the annual meeting each year.

Section 3. Life membership offered for a payment of \$5.00 was closed in 1995, but such memberships in effect will continue to be honored.

ARTICLE V – Meetings

Section 1. The Annual Meeting shall be a breakfast meeting on the last day of the State Conference, unless otherwise ordered by the president after conferring with the state regent.

Section 2. Special meetings of the State Officers' Club or the State Officers' Club Executive Committee may be called by the president and shall be called upon the written request of five members.

Section 3. A guorum of the annual meeting shall be the number present.

ARTICLE VI - Officers

Section 1. The officers of the club shall be a president, three vice presidents, a chaplain, a secretary, a treasurer and a reporter.

Section 2. Election procedures. The election of officers shall be held at the annual meeting. A nominating committee of three members shall report a nominee for each office. Nominations may be made from the floor with the prior consent of the nominee. The election shall be by ballot, unless there is but one nominee for each office, in which case, the election may be by voice. A majority vote of members present shall elect. The second vice president shall be the chairman of the nominating committee and shall appoint the two other members of the committee. The term of office shall be for one year only, and no officer may succeed herself.

Section 3. Duties of Officers.

- a. The President shall preside at all meetings and shall appoint all committees except the nominating committee. She shall confer with the State Regent regarding plans for the annual meeting. She shall approve the disbursement of club funds. She shall send a report of the meeting to the State Recording Secretary for the KSDAR Annual Proceedings.
- b. The First Vice President shall perform the duties of the president in her absence and shall serve as chairman of the bylaws committee. She shall be the doorkeeper.

- c. The Second Vice President shall be the chairman of the nominating committee. She shall appoint two other members to serve on the committee.
- d. The Third Vice President shall be the membership chairman and shall notify the newly elected State Society officers that they are eligible for membership in the club. She shall arrange for the initiation of the new members.
- e. The Chaplain shall conduct memorial and religious services as the occasion may require. She shall be in charge of the installation of new officers.
- f. The Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of all meetings and shall be the custodian of the club records. She shall send the President a copy of the minutes immediately after the meeting. She shall send a copy of the minutes to the newly elected State Officers' Club officers.
- g. The Treasurer shall collect dues and shall keep an itemized account of funds collected. Before the annual meeting, she shall ask the conference treasurer for the balance in the club account and for the names of members who have made reservations for the meal identifying those who have included their annual dues. She shall deposit all funds with the KSDAR State Treasurer with an itemized account and shall notify the State Treasurer of funds to be dispersed. She shall keep a list of active members, of eligible members and of life members.
- h. The Reporter shall report items of significant importance about the membership.
- i. Officers may be called upon to report at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VII – Executive Committee

Section 1. The elected officers shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. A guorum of the Executive Committee shall be three members.

Section 3. If there is a vacancy in the office of president, the first vice president shall succeed to that office. A vacancy in any other office shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VIII – Guests

The guests of the KSDAR State Conference who are members of the DAR may be guests at the annual meeting, and the cost involved shall be paid from the conference funds. There shall be no other guests at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE IX – Amendments

Section 1. These bylaws shall become effective upon acceptance by the club.

Kansas Daughters send their greetings. Holding the Kansas flag is Angela Anderson, 2010 Kansas Outstanding Junior.

Kansas Daughters earned 900 state and division awards. Awards validate the work of chapters and reflect Master Questionnaire results. Each state officer and chairman creates their own certificates from a template on the state member-only website.

Kansas Promotes Education: DAR Schools – 17,000 Campbell's labels and \$4,100 donated; Literacy Promotion – 17,000 hours tutoring and 3,000 books donated. A Transitions protocol was developed to help chapters experiencing challenges in membership and leadership and shows how chapter doors of hospitality can open wider. Closer working relationships are established between state and district officers and chapters. Situations are identified before becoming problems, and using experience and teamwork, results can be achieved. One hundred percent of the chapters used the Electronic Master Questionnaire. Twenty-eight chapters publish a newsletter. Sixteen chapters have a membership brochure.

Kansas Works for Historic Preservation: Restoration of the Santa Fe Trail DAR markers has been completed. The 89 original red granite markers were cleaned, stained, and sealed. Come to Kansas and travel the Santa Fe Trail, following our guideposts. Kansas Daughters enthusiastically support the restoration of our DAR buildings, with several major donors and all 59 chapters achieving 100% participation.

Kansas Embraces Patriotism: DAR Service for Veterans— 12,000 volunteer hours, 35,000 travel miles, and \$39,000 donated; DAR Project Patriot—5,300 items, \$15,000 donated, and many helmet liners knitted; Americanism—participation in 28 naturalization ceremonies. The DAR Medal of Honor was awarded to Col. Gary LaGrange USA (Ret) for his "Help us Learn... Give us Hope" foundation, which provides school supplies and books to children in Iraq and Afghanistan. Nine-hundred thirty-five Kansas children participate in Junior American Citizens' clubs.

State Regent's Biography Shirley S Coupal, 2007-2010

Thirty-eighth State Regent, Shirley S. Coupal, was born in Clay Center, Kansas, on a very snowy, icy day in January. She is the oldest child of Warren E. Coupal and Betty Lorraine Carver. Besides her parents, family members include sister, Jean Coupal-Smith; brother and sister-in-law, Doug Coupal and Michelle Carlson; nieces, Jessica Smith Young and Kinsey Michelle Coupal; nephews, Brenton Smith and Kyler Coupal; great-niece, Isabella Victoria Young. She was raised on a farm in western Clay County, Kansas, which has belonged to her family for over 100 years.

Shirley was part of the last 8th grade class to attend the rural Clay County elementary schools. She graduated from Clay County Community High School in 1967. This was the first class to attend all four years and graduate in the new high school. It was also the largest high school class to ever graduate in Clay County, thanks to the post-war baby boom. She graduated from Kansas State University in 1971 with a Bachelor of Science in Biology. After completing her academic and clinical Laboratory Medicine education at the University of Kansas School of Allied Health, at the University of Kansas Medical Center, she received another Bachelor of Science in Laboratory Medicine in 1972. She was certified by the American Society of Clinical Pathologists as a Medical Technologist (now Medical Laboratory Scientist) in 1972. Later Shirley attended the satellite campus of Central Michigan University in Kansas City, Missouri, graduating with a Master of Arts in Business, with a concentration in health care finance, in 1987.

She has lived in the Kansas City area since 1971 and has held staff and managerial positions in Laboratory Medicine at Providence Medical Center, the University of Kansas Medical Center, Kaiser Permanente, and Children's Mercy Hospitals and Clinics. She is currently the night laboratory supervisor at Children's Mercy main campus, downtown Kansas City, Missouri.

Among her maternal ancestors, she counts John Howland of the Mayflower; Captain John Gorham; and Robert Carver founder of Marshfield, Massachusetts. Her paternal ancestors include Antoine Coupal dit LaReine and Marie-Louise Palin Dabonville. Antoine was the only Coupal to settle in New France near Montreal. As far as it is known, all Coupals living in the United States or Canada are descended from Antoine and Marie-Louise. Shirley has compiled the oral history of the Coupal family into a written work, Family History.

Shirley joined DAR in 1981 as a Junior and her service to the organization has been continuous. National service – Page, House, and Marshal Committees at Continental Congress; National Vice Chairman, Membership – Prospective Members; National Awards include: Outstanding Achievement in Promoting American History, Spirit of America Award for Exceptional Creative Membership Projects, Outstanding Membership Promotion: Membership Road Show, Kansas Use of Computers for DAR, Kansas Outstanding Member of DAR Speakers Staff, many other awards for membership and history. She belongs to The Heritage Club, National Officers Club, National Vice Chairmen's Association, State Regent's Club, and State Vice Regent's Club.

State service - Page and Marshal Committees at State Conference; State Chairmanships - Marshal, Santa Fe Trail DAR Marker and Membership Committees, Member State Finance Committee for 3 terms, Member District Procedural Guidelines Ad Hoc Committee, Chairman of District Guideline Revision Committee. She researched, compiled, and edited the KSDAR Centennial History Book, Looking Back Trails to the Second Century; compiled and edited the Addendum and Errata to the reproduction of Mrs. T.A. Cordry's, The Marking of the Santa Fe Trail; surveyed, compiled and edited, The 90th Anniversary Survey of the DAR Santa Fe Trail Markers; and compiles articles for the KSDAR website and outside publications. A centennial survey of the DAR Santa Fe Trail markers will be completed late 2010. The Second Century, 1997-2010, an updated history of KSDAR, will be available in September 2010. Shirley has held the state offices of State Regent, vice regent, recording secretary, and historian. She was elected Honorary State Regent (April, 2010). She belongs to the Junior Club, as an organizing member; State Officer's Club, Chapter Regent's Club, State Chairman's Club, and Cameo Generations, as a charter member. She received the Martha Washington Medal from the Kansas State Society Sons of the American Revolution.

As State Regent, she emphasized education for chapter officers, state chairmen, and members by producing <u>Kansas Roadmap to DAR</u>, a handy reference for members and officers; <u>Guide for Chapters</u>, practical tips for chapter officers; <u>Transitions</u>, using change to enrich your chapter; and <u>Open Door Tips</u>, creating a welcoming chapter.

Her State Regent's Project restored the century old DAR Santa Fe Trail Markers. It was widely supported by the Kansas Daughters and with the addition of a National Park Service Cost Challenge Share Grant, it was fully funded. The work on the markers was completed in 2010.

Shirley's district service includes Northwest District Director, Assistant Director, Secretary, and Treasurer. She joined the Nathan Edson Chapter at Clay Center serving as regent, vice regent, and historian and has held many chapter committee chairmanships: Public Relations, Yearbook, Chapter Achievement, VIS, Membership, Bylaws, and others.

Having an avocation for history and being a historic trails enthusiast, she belongs to Kansas State Historical Society; Missouri Historical Society; Nebraska State Historical Society; Santa Fe Trail Association (SFTA), Wet/Dry Route and Missouri River Outfitters Chapters, and has written several articles about the DAR markers for the SFTA publication WagonTracks; Oregon-California Trail Association (OCTA), Trails Head and Nebraska Chapters, and is working with the Nebraska Daughters to find their almost century old Oregon Trail markers; Lewis & Clark Heritage Foundation, Kansas-Missouri River Bend Chapter (past member); and Kansas City Area Historic Trails Association, past vice president. She is considered a leader in the Kansas City area historic trail groups and as such is involved with The Partnership for the National Trails System.

Shirley also belongs to other heritage and genealogical societies. She belongs to The Arbella Chapter of the Daughters of the American Colonists (DAC) and is currently serving as Archival Records Preservation State Chairman. She is serving her second term as State President of Daughters of Colonial Wars (DCW) and is past National Historian. She eligible to belong to the General Society of Mayflower Descendents, as she did the research her sister's papers.

She will continue to be active in KSDAR as Membership co-chairman and chairman of the Chapter Development and Revitalization Commission.

KSDAR has exceeded its assessment of \$16,782.00 for the President General's project. Forty chapters gave more than their fair share for a total contribution of \$17,908.00.

Bylaws And Standing Rules Of the Kansas Society Of the National Society Of the Daughters Of the American Revolution

CORPORATE CHARTER OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

FIRST: The Name of the corporation is the KANSAS SOCIETY of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION.

SECOND: The name and address of its Resident Agent in this State is Jane Hurt, State Treasurer, 10615 W. 109th St., Overland Park, Johnson County, KS 66210-1354.

THIRD: This Corporation is organized NOT for profit, and the objects and purposes to be transacted and carried on are:

- (1) To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebration of all patriotic anniversaries.
- (2) To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing a enlightened public opinion, and according to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
- (3) To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.
- (4) This corporation shall have power to receive title to real and personal property by gift, devise, bequest or purchase; to own, hold, sell, convey, lease and re-lease, let and sublet real and personal property; and to manage, invest, reinvest or disburse the funds that may accrue from the holdings of such property in the manner provided by the Bylaws of the Kansas Society as now constituted or as hereafter amended. This corporation shall have the power to sue and to be sued.

No officer, director or member of this corporation shall be individually liable for the obligations of the corporation.

These articles may be amended by two-thirds vote, provided a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society. This corporation shall have such other authority as may be provided in the Bylaws of the Kansas Society, not in contravention of the provisions of this Charter or the laws of the State of Kansas.

This corporation shall not have authority to issue capital stock.

FOURTH: The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation, and shall be the managers of the business of the corporation and shall hold, manage and control all property of the corporation. The members of the Kansas Society and all persons who shall hereafter become members, who are in good standing under the Bylaws of said Society, shall be members of this corporation.

FIFTH: The term for which this corporation is to exist is ONE HUNDRED YEARS.

BYLAWS OF THE KANSAS SOCIETY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Revised by the Ninety-third KSDAR Conference March 6, 1991 Amended 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1996, 1999, 2000, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2009, 2010

ARTICLE I

Title

The name of this organization shall be the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II Object

The object of the Kansas Society shall be to promote the objects of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, particularly in the state of Kansas:

- (1)To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the American Revolution and publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of Revolutionary soldiers and patriots; and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries;
- (2)To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American People, "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American Citizens;
- (3)To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom; to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Members.

The membership of the Kansas Society shall consist of the chapters of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution in the state of Kansas

Section 2. New Chapters.

The State Organizing Secretary shall notify the Executive Committee the following information about a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society: name and location, date of organization, names and addresses of its chapter officers and members, and chapter code number. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society and to belong to a District according to its location.

ARTICLE IV Fees and Dues

Section 1. Fiscal Year.

The fiscal year of the Kansas Society shall be January 1 through December 31.

Section 2. Dues.

The annual state dues of a chapter shall be \$7.00 per chapter member, payable to the State Treasurer showing a Federal Postal Service or other carrier cancellation date no later than December 1. Only a member whose state dues have been paid by December 1 shall be eligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference.

Dues for a member admitted or reinstated at the October National Board of Management meeting shall be credited for the upcoming dues year, which begins December 1.

Section 3. Additional Payments.

- (a) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the annual state dues received from each chapter member five cents for the support of the Kansas State Society Children of the American Revolution. The KSDAR State Treasurer shall forward these funds to the K.S.C.A.R. Senior State Treasurer.
- (b) Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the annual state dues received from each chapter member ten cents for the Kansas DAR Library Fund to help meet the annual library expenses of rent, insurance, operating costs and purchases and maintenance of equipment.

ARTICLE V Officers

Section 1. Officers.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be a State Regent, a State Vice Regent, a State Chaplain, a State Recording Secretary, a State Corresponding Secretary, a State Organizing Secretary, a State Treasurer, a State Registrar, a State Historian, a State Librarian and a State Reporter.

Section 2. Eligibility.

To be eligible for the office of State Regent or State Vice Regent, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state of Kansas for at least five years prior to her election and shall have served as a Chapter Regent for at least one-half of the chapter term.

To be eligible for any other state office, a member of the National Society shall have held membership in a chapter within the state of Kansas for at least two years.

No member, except the State Treasurer, shall be eligible to the same office for two successive terms, and no member who has served two terms in any state office shall be eligible to any other state office, except that of State Regent or State Vice Regent, until the expiration of at least one year. No member shall be eligible for any state office as a district officer-elect.

A member having served more than one-half of a term in a state office shall be deemed to have served a term.

Section 3. Term.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall hold office for three years or until their successors are elected, and their term of office shall begin at the close of the Continental Congress at which the election of the State Regent and State Vice Regent is confirmed.

Section 4. Expenses.

The expenses of the State Officers, as approved in the budget, shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment. Requests to be reimbursed for additional expenses shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the Executive Committee for its action.

Section 5. Vacancies.

If the office of State Regent becomes vacant, the State Vice Regent shall become State Regent.

Vacancies in other state offices shall be filled by appointment of the Executive Committee, with the approval of the State Board of Management, until the next regular meeting of the State Conference, when the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by the Kansas Society.

Section 6. Automatic Resignation.

Any State Officer unable to carry out the duties of her office for a period of six months automatically relinquishes her position as a State Officer, unless ruled otherwise by the State Regent with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 7. Honorary State Regent.

In recognition of valuable service to the Kansas Society, a member who has served as State Regent, upon her retirement from office, may be elected Honorary State Regent for life. Election shall be at State Conference and may be

by voice vote. An Honorary State Regent is entitled to a vote at the State Conference.

ARTICLE VI Nominations and Elections

Section 1. Election.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall be elected at the State Conference every third year, coinciding with the year of election of National Executive Officers. The election shall be by ballot unless there is but one nominee for each office, in which case, by general consent, the written ballot may be dispensed with and the vote for the entire ticket taken by voice. Should a written ballot be necessary, it shall be prepared by the chairman of the Nominating Committee.

Section 2. Nominating Committee.

(a) Members.

The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members. The chairman and an alternate shall be elected at the September State Board of Management meeting during the third year of the administration. Each District shall elect one committee member and an alternate at its annual District meeting which follows.

No member shall be eligible to serve on the Nominating Committee for consecutive terms.

(b) Duties.

Before October 1, the chairman of the Nominating Committee shall notify, in writing, all chapters of the impending election and shall indicate the final date on which the names of members to be considered for state offices shall be received from the chapters.

The committee shall select one nominee for each office. In its selection of candidates, the committee shall endeavor to represent each of the four Districts. No chapter shall have more than one member serving as a State Officer at a time. No nominee shall be eligible for election to a state office unless a chapter endorsement, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary, is received by the Chairman of the Nominating Committee prior to the election.

By January 15, the report of the Nominating Committee shall be sent to the State Officers, the Honorary State Regents and the Chapter Regents.

The report of the Nominating Committee shall be presented at the State Conference. Nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been obtained and the nominee has the endorsement of her chapter, signed by the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Recording Secretary.

Section 3. Vice President General.

A candidate for Vice President General from Kansas shall be endorsed by a majority vote by ballot at a State Conference. No endorsement for Vice President General shall be made more than eighteen months in advance of the Continental Congress so designated in the motion.

ARTICLE VII Duties of Officers

Section 1. General Duties.

The officers of the Kansas Society shall perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws, the Bylaws of the National Society and by its parliamentary authority.

Each State Officer shall prepare an annual report of less than 200 words: 10 days before the beginning of State Conference, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and one copy to the State Recording Secretary. Reports may be submitted electronically. These annual reports shall be presented at the State Conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Within thirty days after Continental Congress, each retiring State Officer, with the exception of the State Recording Secretary, shall deliver to her successor a written procedure of the requirements of her office, a list of the KSDAR property in her custody, and all records and property of the Kansas Society, and she shall obtain a receipt for these items. A duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in custody shall be sent to the State Regent. The State Recording Secretary's deadline shall be September 1.

Section 2. State Regent.

The State Regent shall preside at all meetings of the State Conference, the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee.

She shall be the executive officer and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society.

She shall appoint all committees except the Nominating Committee, naming the chairman of each; shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee; shall appoint a State Parliamentarian; shall cosign all checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts; shall plan the schedule for the September Tour; shall plan and prepare the program for the State Conference and shall approve the arrangements, contract and payments made by the State Conference Chairman and the State Conference Committees.

Along with the State Treasurer, signature cards for all bank accounts and for the safe-deposit box (containing the bonds, securities and other evidence of invested funds of the Kansas Society) shall bear her signature and she shall possess a key to the safe-deposit box.

She shall receive from the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen all statements of expenses, as approved in the budget and present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment.

At the beginning of her term of office, she shall file with the insurance company a complete and current inventory of the materials and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library.

She shall send each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the State Chairmen of the national committees and of any other appointees and shall notify the Chapter Regents of all changes in personnel and addresses of National and State Officers and appointees.

She shall endeavor to visit each chapter in the Kansas Society at least once during her term of office.

Prior to their publication, the State Regent shall approve the final copies of the "Kansas DAR News" and the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 3. State Vice Regent.

In the absence or inability of the State Regent, the State Vice Regent shall perform the duties of the office of State Regent.

The State Vice Regent shall prepare and distribute the official KSDAR stationery; work with the State Regent and the District Directors in planning the District meetings; prepare and print the program for the State September Meeting; and preside at the Chapter Regent's function at the State Conference.

She shall receive from the Chapter Regents their annual lists of names, addresses and telephone numbers of Chapter Chairmen of state and national committees; she shall collate for each State Committee Chairman a listing of the Chapter Chairmen of her committee.

She shall perform any other duties designated to her by the State Regent.

Section 4. State Chaplain.

The State Chaplain shall open and close meetings of the Kansas Society with the reading of scripture and prayer and conduct such religious services as occasion may require.

She shall conduct a Memorial Service at each State Conference; she shall receive the necrology from the State Registrar and prepare the memorial program in a printable format and provide copies to the State Regent and the State Recording Secretary.

She shall send notes of sympathy to the families of recently deceased members.

Section 5. State Recording Secretary.

(a) The State Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Kansas Society, the State Board of Management, the Executive Committee and the Finance Committee.

She shall notify State Officers, Chapter Regents and State Committee Chairmen of any actions taken at these meetings affecting their duties.

She shall maintain the official membership roll of the State Board of Management.

She may cosign checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts. She shall be a member of the Finance Committee.

Each year she shall file the annual reports of State Officers, Chapter Regents, District Directors and State Committee Chairmen until October 1.

(b) It shall be the duty of the State Recording Secretary to compile, edit and publish the Annual Report and Proceedings of the State Conference. A committee to assist with this duty may be selected by the State Recording Secretary. She shall provide to the State Regent who presided at the State Conference a final proof copy of the Proceedings prior to its publication.

By October 1, the State Recording Secretary shall distribute any copies of the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings not collected at the State September Meeting to the members specified in the Standing Rules and to the members who placed prepaid orders.

Section 6. State Corresponding Secretary.

The State Corresponding Secretary shall maintain the official Kansas Society mailing list of the members who are to receive meeting notices, shall attend to all the correspondence of the Kansas Society, and shall assist the State Regent in her official correspondence.

She shall notify the State Officers and the delegates of any special meetings that may be called.

She shall send out notices of meetings of the State Board of Management and the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior.

Immediately after a State Conference at which an election is held, she shall send to each Chapter Regent the names and addresses of the newly elected state officers.

Sixty days before the beginning of State Conference, she shall send the official call for the State Conference to the State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is in the state, the Honorary State Regents, the Chapter Regents, the State Committee Chairmen, and the District Directors.

Sixty days before the beginning of State Conference, she shall send each Chapter Regent one State Conference Credentials Form and one form for reporting chapter officers

She shall assemble the State Information Packet (SIP), be responsible for its distribution during the State September Meeting, and for mailing, by October 1, any packets that have not been collected.

Section 7. State Organizing Secretary.

The State Organizing Secretary shall assist the State Regent and Chapter Organizing Regents in the organization of new chapters.

She shall be responsible for the correspondence related to the organization of a new chapter, and she shall notify the Executive Committee the following information about a chapter newly confirmed by the National Society: name and location, date of organization, names and addresses of its chapter officers and members, and chapter code number. This notification shall cause the newly confirmed chapter to be enrolled as a member of the Kansas Society and a District assignment shall be made.

She shall determine the possibilities for new chapters within the state and shall assist existing chapters in maintaining their memberships and in gaining new members.

She shall receive from the Chapter Regents each year by April 1, the Chapter Officers Report Forms. The form may be submitted electronically. Each year by June 1, she shall send lists of the names and addresses of the current Chapter Regents to the State Reporter for posting on the KSDAR members' website and to the State Recording Secretary for publication in the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 8. State Treasurer.

The State Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all funds and securities of the Kansas Society. She shall deposit them in the name of the Kansas Society Daughters of the American Revolution and shall disburse these funds as directed by the State Board of Management or the State Conference. All checks drawn on the Kansas Society accounts shall be cosigned by the State Regent, except in cases of emergency when the State Recording Secretary may cosign.

Upon assuming the duties of her office, she may transfer the checking accounts to a convenient, federally insured banking institution, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee; this action shall be ratified at the next meeting of the State Board of Management.

After each state meeting, she shall receive from the State Meetings Treasurer any balance remaining after all approved bills have been paid and a minimal balance maintained from the State Meetings account, along with the State Meetings Treasurer's financial accounting of income and expenses; this money shall be deposited in the General Fund within six weeks of the meeting's close. A full accounting of income and expenses for the State Conference and State September Meeting shall be printed in the KSDAR Annual Report and Proceedings.

She shall keep an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures, close the books on December 31, and submit them for audit to an audit committee. She shall present the auditor's report annually.

She shall serve as the chairman of the Finance Committee. (See Article XI, Section 4.)

Prior to the State Conference, she shall report to the State Credentials Committee Chairman the number of votes to which each chapter is entitled. After the delegates and alternates are elected, she shall verify their eligibility for the State Credentials Committee.

She shall be bonded, along with other listed state officers, in a Signature Officers Bond; the fee to be paid by the Kansas Society.

She shall be the custodian of all bonds, securities, and other evidence of invested funds and shall rent a safe-deposit box for their safekeeping. A key to the safe-deposit box shall be issued to the State Treasurer and to the State Regent.

Signature cards for all bank accounts shall bear the signatures of the State Regent, State Treasurer, and State Recording Secretary. Signature cards for the safe-deposit box shall bear the signatures of the State Regent and State Treasurer.

All bank accounts under the jurisdiction of the Kansas Society shall be listed under the Employment Identification Number (EIN) of the Kansas Society and shall bear the signature of the State Regent and the State Treasurer. Authorized members of any entity under the jurisdiction of KSDAR shall be responsible for sending original bank statements, along with a reconciled report, each month to the State Treasurer and for keeping record of paid members, meal reservations, and any other sources of income. The State Treasurer shall receive the monthly bank statements and reconciled reports from these entities and shall include their financial information as a line item in her report to the State Conference.

She shall retain the audited accounts and the tax records of the Kansas Society for a period of six years and shall be responsible for their transfer to her successor at the close of the term.

Section 9. State Registrar.

The State Registrar shall keep the files containing the names of all chapter members of the Kansas Society and, when possible, the names of the members at large residing in Kansas. The record shall include: full name, including maiden name and, if married, husband's full name; full date of admittance by the National Society; national number; name of chapter or, if the member has belonged to more than one chapter, the names of her original and current chapters; name and rank of ancestor, with name of child through whom the lineage is traced; colony or state; and the dates and locations of any transfers. The State Registrar shall receive the membership changes from the Chapter Registrars. She shall update the membership files with the information reported by the chapters, including changes in membership by admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address.

Prior to the State Conference, she shall prepare a necrology for the Memorial Service and shall furnish copies to the State Regent and the State Chaplain.

She shall maintain a current mailing list and provide the mailing list for the Kansas DAR News.

Section 10. State Historian.

The State Historian shall direct such historical work as may be required by the Kansas Society or suggested by the National Society.

She shall keep a file of all historical markers and monuments erected by the Kansas Society.

She shall prepare and submit an annual report to the Historian General.

She shall keep a reference record of the archives of the Kansas Society and, at the close of her term, shall prepare copies of the inventory for the following incoming officers: State Regent, State Vice Regent, and State Historian.

At the close of the administration, she shall prepare a summary of the highlights of the past three years and the State Regent's biography to be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 11. State Librarian.

The State Librarian shall have supervision of the Kansas DAR Library and shall serve as the chairman of the State Library Committee.

She shall be responsible for all books, papers, microfilm, microfiche, and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library. She shall keep a current list of all the materials and equipment in the Kansas DAR Library and shall submit to the State Regent duplicate copies of the list, one of which shall be for the insurance company.

She shall list in her annual report all materials sent to the NSDAR Library and all those accepted for the Kansas DAR Library. These lists shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

She shall work with the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee in maintaining the Kansas DAR Library.

Section 12. State Reporter.

The State Reporter shall oversee the Kansas Society's Internet and related electronic publishing activity, including the 'Kansas DAR News,' Cyber-Sunflower, Webmaster, websites, Volunteer Information Specialists and Public Relations and Media Committees, and such other related duties requested by the State Regent. Along with the State Regent, she shall receive a final proof copy of each issue of the 'Kansas DAR News' from its editor prior to its publication.

ARTICLE VIII Meetings

Section 1. Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Kansas Society shall be known as the State Conference and shall be held in the Spring. The date and location of the State Conference shall be determined by the State Regent. The host District shall be determined by established rotation. The meeting shall be for the purpose of receiving reports of the State Officers, the State Board of Management, the Chapter Regents, the District Directors, and the State Chairmen of all committees; the election of officers; and for any other business that may arise.

Section 2. Voting Members.

The voting members of the State Conference or any special meeting of the Kansas Society shall be the State Officers, the National Officers and Honorary National Officers whose memberships are within the state, the Honorary State Regents, each Chapter Regent or, in her absence, the First Vice Regent or alternate, and the elected delegates or alternates of each chapter in the state entitled to representation at the State Conference. A member holding two or more offices, each carrying a vote at the Annual State Conference, shall be limited to one vote.

Section 3. Qualifications.

Each chapter entitled to representation at the Continental Congress, in accordance with the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the National Society, shall be entitled to representation at the State Conference, provided that its members' state dues are credited to the State Treasurer by December 1 and its State Credentials Forms have been completed in accordance with these bylaws.

Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected by their respective chapters prior to sixty days before the beginning of State Conference each year and reported by forty-five days before the beginning of State Conference on State Credentials Forms (See Article XIII, Section 4(b), of these bylaws). A delegate or an alternate shall have been a member of her chapter for one year immediately preceding the State Conference to which she is elected and shall be in good standing with the National and Kansas Societies at the time of her election, as verified by the State Treasurer.

The Regent or First Vice Regent of a newly organized chapter may be a delegate.

Section 4. Chapter Delegates and Alternates.

- (a) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any meeting of the Kansas Society during the year, beginning January 1, shall be based upon the number of members whose national and state dues for the current year have been paid by the December 1 preceding the State Conference, provided that the chapter meets the qualifications for representation in accordance with Section 3 of this Article. A member whose national and state dues are delinquent shall not be counted in determining representation at the meetings of the Kansas Society, shall not be entitled to vote for delegates or alternates to meetings of the Kansas Society, and shall not be entitled to act as representative or alternate at such meetings.
- (b) The representation of a chapter at the State Conference or at any other meeting of the Kansas Society shall be as follows:

12 through 49 members Regent and two delegates 3 votes 50 through 199 members Regent and five delegates 6 votes 200 through 299 members Regent and eight delegates 9 votes

(c) The number of alternates elected by a chapter shall not exceed twice the number of voters to which the chapter is entitled.

Section 5. Privileges.

- (a) Any member of the National Society who is a member in good standing of a chapter in the Kansas Society or a member-at-large residing in Kansas may attend the State Conference.
- (b) State Committee Chairmen and District Directors who are not elected delegates shall have the privilege to speak without vote.

Section 6. State Conference Registration.

Kansas members who attend any meeting or meal of the State Conference shall pay a registration fee, determined by the State Regent, not to exceed \$5.00. This fee shall be paid to the State Meetings Treasurer by the designated deadline. The registration fee shall be applied toward the expenses of the State Conference.

Section 7. State September Meeting.

The meetings held in the month of September shall be known as the State September Meeting. The date and location shall be determined by the State Regent. The host District shall be determined by established rotation. The meeting shall include the State Board of Management Meeting and may include the Annual District Meetings and functions for the purpose of education and leadership training for chapter regents, registrars, treasurers and other interested members, as well as computer, genealogical and related workshops.

Section 8. State September Meeting Registration.

Kansas members who attend the State September Meeting shall register. Reservation checks for meals and any other payments associated with the State September Meeting shall be sent to the State Meetings Treasurer by the designated deadline.

Section 9. State Meetings Chairman and Treasurer.

A State Meetings Chairman and a State Meetings Treasurer shall be appointed by the State Regent.

The State Meetings Chairman shall be responsible for planning and coordinating the arrangements of the State Conference and State September Meeting under the supervision of the State Regent and in cooperation with the host District.

For the State Conference, after consultation with the State Meetings Chairman, the State Regent shall appoint the committees deemed necessary and the members to assist the Credentials Committee Chairman. The State Meetings Chairman shall assign the various functions at the State Conference to the chapters in the host District and shall serve as an advisor for their plans. Along with the State Regent, she shall sign on vouchers for payments of State Conference expenses.

For the State September Meeting, the State Meetings Chairman shall serve as an advisor and work in collaboration with the State Regent, State Vice

Regent, and the host District Director to assist with organizing the various functions and tasks.

The State Meetings Treasurer shall receive the registration fees, meal reservations, and any other payments for the State Conference, which shall include the KSDAR State Conference allotment. She shall pay the bills of the State Conference which have been authorized by vouchers bearing the signatures of the State Regent and the State Meetings Chairman. After all approved bills have been paid and allowance for minimal balance to maintain the account, she shall send any money remaining in the State Meetings account, along with a full accounting of income and expenses, to the State Treasurer prior to six weeks of the meeting's close.

She shall receive payments for the State September Meeting, which may include a KSDAR allotment, and shall place the money in the State Meetings account. She shall pay the bills of the State September Meeting which have been authorized by voucher bearing the signatures of the State Regent and the State Meetings Chairman. After all approved bills have been paid and allowance for a minimal balance to maintain the account, she shall send any money remaining in the State Meetings account, along with a full accounting of income and expenses, to the State Treasurer prior to six weeks of the meeting's close.

The State Meetings account shall be closed six weeks after the end of the administration in which it was opened."

Section 10. Special Meetings.

Special meetings of the Kansas Society may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of five chapters. The purpose of the meeting shall be stated in the call. Except in cases of emergency, at least fifteen days notice shall be given, and only the business specified in the call shall be transacted. The delegates and alternates elected for the State Conference shall be the delegates and alternates for any special meeting of the Kansas Society, which may be held prior to the State Conference of the following year.

Section 11. Quorum.

Twenty-five voting members, of which twenty shall be chapter representatives, shall constitute a quorum at the State Conference or any special meeting of the Kansas Society.

ARTICLE IX State Board of Management

Section 1. Members.

The State Board of Management shall consist of the elected State Officers, the National Officers whose membership is within the state, and each Chapter Regent in the state or, in her absence, the Chapter Vice Regent.

State Chairman of Committees, District Directors, and Honorary State Regents may attend the meeting of the State Board of Management with voice but no vote.

Section 2. Officers.

The Officers of the Kansas Society shall be the officers of the State Board of Management.

Section 3. Meetings.

Regular meetings of the State Board of Management shall be held at the call of the State Regent, at least twice a year. One meeting shall be held in the September preceding the Annual District Meetings and the second meeting shall immediately precede the State Conference. Except in cases of emergency, at least thirty days' notice of the time and location of the meetings shall be given.

Section 4. Authority.

The State Board of Management shall have all power and authority over the affairs of the Kansas Society during the interim between meetings of the State Conference, except that of modifying any action taken by a regular or special meeting of the Kansas Society.

Section 5. Duties.

The State Board of Management shall report annually to the State Conference, shall ratify any decisions made by the Executive Committee, and may make recommendations to the State Conference.

It shall approve any appointment made by the Executive Committee to fill a vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent.

It shall elect the chairman and an alternate of the State Nominating Committee at the September State Board of Management meeting in the third year of an administration.

It shall approve the budget submitted by the Finance Committee, shall ratify any transfer of funds by the State Treasurer, and shall consider any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society.

Section 6. Special Meetings.

Special meetings may be called by the State Regent and shall be called upon the written request of seven voting members of the Board. No business shall be transacted except that specified in the call, which shall be given at least fifteen days prior.

Section 7. Quorum.

Eleven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the State Board of Management.

ARTICLE X Executive Committee

Section 1. Members.

The elected officers of the Kansas Society shall constitute the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Meetings.

The Executive Committee shall hold meetings prior to the regularly scheduled meetings of the State Board of Management, at the call of the State Regent, or upon the written request of three of its members. Except in cases of emergency, at least ten days' notice shall be given.

Section 3. Authority.

The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Kansas Society between the meetings of the State Board of Management. The Executive Committee shall be subject to the orders of the State Conference, and none of its acts shall conflict with action taken by the Kansas Society.

Section 4. Duties.

The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact business between meetings of the State Board of Management and to report all actions and recommendations to the next meeting of the State Board.

It shall approve the standing and special committees appointed by the State Regent.

It shall declare a vacancy in any state office or committee for failure to perform stated duties; shall rule on any exception to an automatic resignation of a State Officer; shall fill any vacancy in a state office, except that of State Regent, subject to the approval of the State Board of Management.

It shall approve any transfer of funds made by the State Treasurer.

It shall consider any special matters or recommendations concerning the Kansas DAR Library referred to it by the State Library Committee.

It shall receive and act upon requests for reimbursements of additional expenses submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, by the State Officers and the State Committee Chairmen.

Section 5. Emergency Business.

When necessary, the Executive Committee may conduct business by mail, telephone or electronic communication.

Section 6. Quorum.

Seven members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XI

Committees

Section 1. Standing Committees.

The standing committees of the Kansas Society shall be: Audit, Bylaws, Credentials, Finance, Kansas DAR News, Kansas DAR Scholarship, Resolutions, and State Library.

Section 2. Audit Committee.

Each administration a committee of three qualified members shall be appointed by the State Regent for the purpose of examining the books and providing an annual audit report.

Section 3. Bylaws Committee.

The Bylaws Committee shall be composed of a chairman and four members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Bylaws Committee to consider all properly submitted proposals for amendments and to present amendments and recommendations concerning the Bylaws to the State Conference for action.

Amendments and recommendations from the chapters, the Executive Committee, the State Board of Management, or the previous State Conference shall be presented to the committee ninety days prior to the State Conference. (See Article XV, Section 1.)

The committee shall have the right to edit proposed amendments and the right to originate amendments.

Previous notice of all proposed amendments from the Bylaws Committee shall be sent to all chapters thirty days prior to the State Conference.

Section 4. Credentials Committee.

The Credentials Committee Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent. She shall be assisted by members of the host District for State Conference and shall be advised by the State Treasurer and the State Registrar.

It shall be the duty of the chairman to supply the State Credentials Forms to the State Corresponding Secretary, to advise chapters of the number of delegates and alternates to which they are entitled and to receive their State Credentials Forms each year, showing a Federal Postal Service or other carrier cancellation date no later than forty-five days before the beginning of State Conference. She shall examine the returned forms and shall verify with the State Treasurer and State Registrar the eligibilities of the delegates and alternates listed. She shall have charge of the registration and its committee at the State Conference and shall submit credentials reports to the assembly.

It shall be the duty of the Credentials Committee to have the responsibility for the proper identification and registration of the delegates and the alternates attending the State Conference.

Section 5. Finance Committee.

The Finance Committee shall be composed of the State Treasurer, who shall serve as chairman; the State First Vice Regent; the State Recording Secretary; and two members appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to prepare an annual budget to be submitted to the State Board of Management at its meeting preceding the State Conference. The recommended budget shall be submitted to the State Conference for action.

The Finance Committee shall report any recommendations concerning the finances of the Kansas Society to the State Board of Management.

Section 6. Kansas DAR News.

The Chairman of the Kansas DAR News Committee shall be the editor of the 'Kansas DAR News.' She shall prepare the newsletter and oversee its printing. She shall provide to the State Regent a final proof copy of each issue of the 'Kansas DAR News' prior to its publication. The mailing list is provided by the State Registrar.

Section 7. Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee.

The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. It shall be the duty of the Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee to select the recipients of the Kansas DAR Scholarship and the Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship from the eligible applicants. Funds for the Kansas DAR Scholarship and the Kansas DAR Good Citizens Scholarship are provided from interest on designated investments.

It shall also be the duty of this committee to select the Kansas Society's candidate for the NSDAR American History Scholarship.

The committee shall follow the guidelines set forth in the special section concerning Scholarships.

Section 8. Resolutions Committee.

The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of a chairman and two members, all appointed by the State Regent. The courtesy resolution shall be prepared and presented by the Resolutions Committee.

Section 9. State Library Committee.

The State Library Committee shall be composed of the State Librarian, who shall serve as chairman, and four members appointed by the State Regent. The Committee may meet quarterly and shall meet upon the request of the State Regent.

The State Library committee shall have the authority to select and purchase genealogical materials for the Kansas DAR Library, which will benefit the members of the chapters in the Kansas Society; all such purchases shall be subject to the approval of the State Regent and shall be made from donated funds designated for that purpose.

It shall be the duty of the State Library Committee to bring any special matters concerning the Kansas DAR Library to the attention of the Executive Committee and to request approval of purchases of non-routine equipment and supplies, which exceed the balance designated for that purpose in the Library Petty Cash Fund.

It shall promote greater use by loan of the books in the Kansas DAR Library and shall encourage donations of genealogical books, periodicals and other materials from chapters, members of chapters, and other interested individuals.

It shall serve as an advisor to the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee. The Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee shall be composed of members of the Dodge City Chapter, who shall be appointed by the Chapter Regent. It shall be the duty of this committee to assist the State Librarian in maintaining the materials and equipment of the State Library and in providing library services to members, according to the guidelines set by the Executive Committee.

Section 10. Other Committees.

Such other committees, standing or special, shall be appointed by the State Regent as the Kansas Society may authorize or as the National Society may require. The State Regent shall be ex officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.

Section 11. Committee Appointments.

Appointments of committee chairmen and members shall be concurrent with the term of the appointing State Regent.

Section 12. Expenses.

The expenses of the State Committee Chairmen, as approved in the budget, shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the State Regent, who shall present them to the State Treasurer for authorized payment. Additional expenses shall be submitted as itemized statements in writing, with receipts, to the Executive Committee.

Section 13. Reports.

Each State Committee Chairman shall prepare an annual report of less than 200 words: 10 days before the beginning of State Conference, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and one copy to the State Recording Secretary. Reports may be submitted electronically. These annual reports shall be presented at the State conference and shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Each State Committee Chairman shall prepare and send by the designated deadline a report to the Vice Chairman of the South Central Division of her committee. A copy of this report shall be sent to the State Regent.

Section 14. Transfer of Records and Property.

At the completion of her term, each State Committee Chairman shall deliver to the State Regent or, if so instructed, to the newly appointed State Chairman of her committee, a written procedure of the requirements of her chairmanship, a list of the KSDAR property in her custody, and all records and property of the Kansas Society, and she shall obtain a receipt for these items. She shall provide a duplicate of the list of the KSDAR property in her custody for the State Regent.

ARTICLE XII Districts

Section 1. Names.

The Kansas Society shall be divided into four Districts: the Northeast District, the Northwest District, the Southeast District, and the Southwest District. The chapters in each District are designated in the Standing Rules.

Section 2. Jurisdiction.

The four Districts are under the jurisdiction of the Kansas Society. Each District shall have the privilege to allow for any traditional procedures and courtesies, provided that they shall not conflict with the Bylaws and Standing Rules of the National and Kansas Societies.

District officers shall be responsible for complying with NSDAR directives in regard to their District's finances. (See Article VII, Section 8, Paragraph 10.)

Section 3. Meetings.

- (a) The meetings of the Districts shall be held for the general purpose of expanding the programs of the National and Kansas Societies, to provide instruction and inspiration to chapter members, and to acquaint them with the State Officers and the State Committee Chairman.
- (b) The Annual District Meetings shall be held in the September, following the State Board of Management, for the purpose of receiving the reports of its officers and conducting the business of the District. In the second year of an administration, each District shall elect a District Nominating Committee, and in the third year of an administration, each district shall elect a member and an alternate to represent the district on the State Nominating Committee. Results of these elections shall be submitted to the State Recording Secretary by October 1. District officers shall be elected at the Annual District Meeting during the third year of an administration. The schedule for the meetings shall be published in the "Kansas DAR News".

Section 4. Officers.

The officers shall be a Director, an Assistant Director, and a Secretary-Treasurer. Officers shall be elected for a term of three years at the Annual District Meeting preceding the election of the State Officers and shall assume

the duties of their office at the close of the State Conference at which the State Officers are elected. No member shall be eligible to succeed herself in the same District office. A member may serve consecutive terms in the three offices of her District; such consecutive service shall be limited to three terms.

Section 5. State Conference.

The Districts shall host the State Conference by rotation in the following order: the Northwest District, the Northeast District, the Southeast District, and the Southwest District. If necessary, the rotation order may be altered. The chapters in the host District shall be assigned responsibilities for the State Conference by the State Conference Chairman.

ARTICLE XIII Chapters

Section 1. Officers.

The chapters shall elect their officers by February 1 of the year in which they elect officers. Newly elected chapter officers shall assume the duties of their offices after the close of Continental Congress.

The chapter officers reported to the National Society and recognized for the transaction of business with the National Society shall be the Regent, the First Vice Regent, the Recording Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Registrar. Each chapter shall have these five officers, and no member shall hold two of these offices, except in chapters with thirty (30) or fewer members. No one member in any chapter shall hold the office of chapter regent and chapter treasurer at the same time. (NSDAR Bylaws, Article XIII, Chapters, Section 6 (a)).

A chapter may elect such additional officers as it deems necessary and is authorized to adopt bylaws and rules for the transaction of business provided that they do not conflict with the Bylaws of the National Society or of the state organization. (NSDAR Bylaws, Article XIII, Chapters, Section 6 (d)).

Section 2. Chapter Officer Report Forms.

Each year before April 1, the Chapter Regent shall report the names and addresses of the chapter officers for the ensuing year. This report shall be made on forms from the office of the Organizing Secretary General, Chapter Services, which are furnished to the chapters by the State Corresponding Secretary or may be printed electronically from the NSDAR Members' Web Site, and shall include the names and addresses of all chapter officers whether newly elected or completing the term of election; the date of which office is assumed; and the length of term. The completed form shall be returned to the State Organizing Secretary and the Organizing Secretary General by the April 1 deadline. The forms may be submitted electronically.

Section 3. Provision for Fees and Dues in Chapter Bylaws.

A chapter may provide in its bylaws for fees and dues for chapter use in addition to national and state dues, but may not levy assessments in excess of the requirements of its bylaws. The bylaws of a chapter shall prescribe a date for collection of chapter dues sufficiently in advance to meet the requirements for payment to the National and Kansas Societies before December 1.

Section 4. Representation and Return of Credentials Forms.

(a) Delegates and alternates to the Continental Congress shall be elected on or before the first day of the second month preceding the month of Continental Congress of each year. Using blanks furnished by the National Society, the name of the Chapter Regent and First Vice Regent and a list of the delegates and alternates shall be sent to the chairman of the Credentials Committee and to the State Regent, bearing a postmark no later than the 15th day of the second month preceding the month of Continental Congress.

Only a chapter member in good standing, whose credentials have been completed in accordance with the Standing Rules of the National Society, shall be eligible to represent her chapter at meetings of the National Society. (National Bylaws, Article VIII, Section 2(e).)

(b) Delegates and alternates to the State Conference shall be elected prior to sixty days before the beginning of State Conference of each year. (For number and qualifications of delegates and alternates to State Conference, see Article VIII, Section 3 and 4, of these bylaws.) The name of the Chapter Regent and Vice Regent and a list of the delegates and alternates and the date of their election shall be printed on the State credentials Form, which is furnished to the chapter by the Kansas Society in a mailing from the State Corresponding Secretary, and shall be photocopied and sent to the State Registrar, the State Treasurer, and the State Credentials Committee Chairman forty-five days before the beginning of State Conference.

Only a chapter member in good standing with the National and Kansas Societies, whose state credentials have been completed in accordance to these bylaws, shall be eligible to represent her chapter at meetings of the Kansas Society.

Kansas members who attend any session or meal of the State Conference shall pay a registration fee, determined by the State Regent, not to exceed \$5.00.

Section 5. Chapter Regent.

Annually before August 15, each Chapter Regent shall send to the State Vice Regent a listing of names, addresses, telephone numbers and, if available, e-mail addresses of her chapter's chairmen of national and state committees.

The Chapter Regent is responsible for completing and returning by the stated deadlines the copies of the chapter credentials forms after the election on or before February 1 of the chapter representatives to the Continental Congress and the State Conference.

Each Chapter Regent shall prepare an annual report of less than 200 words: 10 days before the beginning of State Conference, one copy shall be sent to the State Regent and one copy to the State Recording Secretary. Reports may be submitted electronically. These annual reports shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings.

Section 6. Chapter Chaplain.

The Chapter Chaplain shall report deaths immediately to the State Chaplain. Information about the deceased member shall include her name and national number, date of death, name and address of next of kin, and any offices held in the chapter or in the State and National Societies. A newspaper obituary shall be sent with the report of a member's death.

Section 7. Chapter Treasurer.

- (a) Each year before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer shall remit the annual national dues of \$30.00 for every active member in the chapter to the Office of the Treasurer General. The computer printout of the chapter membership, received by the Chapter Treasurer from the Office of the Treasurer General by September 15, shall accompany the chapter's payment of annual national dues. Payments to the Treasurer General, other than those remitted with the computer printout, shall be accompanied by remittance blanks, which may be ordered free of charge from the Officer of the Treasurer General or printed electronically from the NSDAR Member's Web Site. Payments for which remittance blanks are required include additional annual national dues and fees for applications, reinstatements, and supplementals. All checks remitted to the National Society shall be made payable to the Treasurer General, NSDAR.
- (b) Each year before December 1, the Chapter Treasurer shall remit the annual state dues of \$7.00 for every active member in the chapter to the State Treasurer. A copy of the computer printout of the chapter membership by the chapter treasurer from the state treasurer or printed electronically from chapter emembership shall accompany the chapters payment of annual state dues. Only a member whose state dues have been paid by December 1 shall be eligible to serve as a delegate or an alternate at the State Conference.

Each year before December 31, the Chapter Treasurer shall also send to the State Treasurer all chapter contributions for the National Society and the Kansas Society, including the required payments designated in the KSDAR Standing Rules, accompanied by the State Treasurer's Remittance Form. Only payments received by the State Treasurer by December 31 will be processed for that year's reporting period; payments received after December 31 will be applied to the succeeding calendar year's reporting period.

All checks remitted to the Kansas Society shall be made payable to the Kansas Society DAR.

(c) The Chapter Treasurer shall report all changes in membership as they occur to her Chapter Registrar.

Section 8. Chapter Registrar.

The Chapter Registrar shall report to the Organizing Secretary General, in writing, all changes in membership, marriages, divorces, deaths, resignations, transfers, and changes of address as they occur (Bylaws of the National Society, Article XIII, Section 11). These reports of membership changes shall be made on Membership Change Forms and directed to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General, Membership Office. Membership Change Forms may be obtained from the Membership Office.

The Chapter Registrar shall report all changes in membership, in writing, to the State Registrar. She shall report all information necessary for the State Registrar to keep her records exact. Changes in membership by admission, transfer, resignation, removal for nonpayment of dues, reinstatement, death, marriage or divorce, and changes of name or address shall be reported on State Registrar's Report Forms.

Information about newly admitted members shall include: full name, including maiden name, and if married, husband's full name; full date of admittance; national number; name of chapter; name and rank of ancestor, with the name of the child through whom the lineage is traced; and colony, or state. Information about members transferring into the Kansas Society from out of state shall include, in addition to the information required for newly admitted members, the name and location of former chapters and dates of transfers.

ARTICLE XIV Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in the current edition of *Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised* shall govern the Kansas Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws or the Bylaws of the National Society.

ARTICLE XV Amendments

Section 1.

These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those voting at any annual State Conference, provided that a copy of the proposed amendment has been sent to all chapters of the Kansas Society at least thirty days prior to the State Conference, and that the amendment has been proposed by the State Bylaws committee, the State Board of Management, the previous State Conference, or by a chapter of the Kansas Society. An amendment proposed by a chapter shall be endorsed by at least one other chapter in the Kansas Society.

Section 2.

Unless otherwise provided prior to its adoption or in the motion to adopt, an amendment shall take effect at the close of the State Conference at which it is adopted.

Section 3.

Any amendment adopted by the National Society affecting the work of the Kansas Society or the chapters in the state shall become the law of the Kansas Society and chapters without further notice.

ARTICLE XVI Dissolution

Although the period of duration of the Kansas Society is perpetual, if for any reason the Kansas Society is to be dissolved or otherwise terminated, no part of the property of the Kansas Society or any of the proceeds shall be distributed to or inure to the benefit of any of the officers or members of the Kansas Society. Upon the dissolution of the Kansas Society, assets shall be distributed by the Board of Management and/or the Executive Committee to and only National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

SPECIAL SCHOLARSHIPS Revised by the KSDAR Executive Committee March 12, 2003, 2005

Number 1. The Genevieve Pendleton Memorial Endowment Scholarship shall be given the third year of each KSDAR administration to a high school senior who is entering a two or four-year college or university. The selection shall be based on an essay relative to the broad aspect of national defense, the patriotic awareness of the candidate, two references as to the applicant's character and integrity, and an acceptable academic record. Selection shall be made by the State Scholarship Committee Chairman, the State National Defense Committee Chairman, and the State Regent. Scholarship started in 1980-1981 with the original amount of \$2,100.00.

Number 2. The Elizabeth M. Hill Kessler Scholarship shall provide a college scholarship for a girl graduating from high school. The recipient of this scholarship shall have acceptable scholastic ability, show financial need, be a citizen of the United States of America, and be eligible for membership in the DAR. This award will be given the second year of each KSDAR administration. The Kansas DAR Scholarship Committee shall select the recipient.

If the two rooms at the Shawnee Mission in Fairway, Kansas, formerly supported by the KSDAR are again maintained and refurbished by the Kansas Daughters, the interest from this fund shall be used for these purposes and take precedence over the scholarship fund. Scholarship started in 1985-1986 with the original amount of \$2,515.41.

Number 3. The Gladys E. Routh Memorial Scholarship, in memory of her parents, Albert Jesse Jones and Mabel Clare Early Jones, shall be awarded to a deserving boy or girl, preferably one who is at least ½ Pottawatomie Indian. If a deserving individual of Pottawatomie heritage is not available, another Indian heritage may be substituted. The interest from the \$3,000 gift shall be awarded the first year of a KSDAR administration for attendance at an accredited college or university. Members of the scholarship committee who will supervise the awarding of the scholarship shall consist of the KSDAR Scholarship Committee Chairman, the KSDAR American Indians Committee Chairman and a member of the Eunice Sterling Chapter. Scholarship started in 1987-1988 with the original amount of \$3,000.00.

Number 4. A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school student who has DAR eligibility or is a member of DAR. Proof of enrollment in a two or four year accredited college or university shall be required. Members of the state DAR Scholarship Committee shall select the recipient.

Number 5. A Good Citizen scholarship shall be awarded annually following the rules set forth in the Good Citizen contest.

STANDING RULES

Revised by the Ninety-second KSDAR Conference March 17, 1990 Amended 1992, 1993, 1995, 1996, 1997, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2010

Number 1. The report of the Kansas Society shall be known as the Annual Report and Proceedings of the Annual State Conference of the Kansas Society of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The report shall be made available by the Recording Secretary as follows: State Regent, State Officers, Chapters, Honorary State Regents, State Chairmen of National and State Committees, Senior State President C.A.R., District Directors, the Library of the Kansas Society, the Kansas Society DAR Archives in the Kansas DAR Library in Dodge City, Kansas, National Parliamentarian, and the Kansas State Historical Society. In an election year, copies shall be made available to the new officers and the chairmen of committees. Chapter Regents may receive a free copy by special request made before June 1. Other members desiring copies may place by June 1 with the Recording Secretary a prepaid order for costs per copy.

- **Number 2.** At least two issues of the "Kansas DAR News" shall be printed each year and mailed to each member. The printing and mailing expenses shall be borne by the State Society.
- **Number 3.** The sum of \$3,000 shall be allowed the State Regent each year for the purpose of carrying on her work in addition to her office expenses.
- **Number 4.** Twenty-five dollars shall be allowed each State Officer to partially defray her State Conference expenses.
- **Number 5.** Forty dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent at Continental Congress; and forty dollars shall be allowed for the courtesy of flowers for the Kansas State Regent-elect; arrangements shall be made by the State Treasurer.
- **Number 6.** Fifty dollars shall be allotted to the State Regent for Kansas Pages at Continental Congress.
- **Number 7.** Funds budgeted for membership development workshops shall be used for presentation materials, a master workshop packet, IRS allowed volunteer mileage, and turnpike tolls for the workshop leader.
- **Number 8.** Each year, the State Treasurer shall set aside from the General Fund one dollar per chapter member for State Conference expenses. Any money

remaining after the expenses of the State Conference are paid shall be returned to the General Fund of the Kansas Society.

Number 9. Each chapter will pay \$2.00 per year toward the cost of Web hosting for the KSDAR Web site.

Number 10. The money from the Madonna of the Trail Fund and the Marker Preservation Fund shall be put in short term Certificates of Deposits at the best rate available for a short term in an FDIC-insured bank or saving institution, with interest to be deposited back to the original funds.

Number 11. As Certificates of Deposits held by KSDAR mature and are considered for renewal, the State Treasurer shall investigate bank ratings and transfer those funds to other FDIC-insured institutions in order to diversify funds and, thereby, reduce potential risk of exceeding the FDIC limit at any one banking institution.

Number 12. Beginning March 1, 2006 at the request of a chapter, memorials for deceased persons will be entered into the Chapel Memorial Book. Non-KSDAR names maybe placed in the Memorial Book for a fee of \$10.00.

Number 13. Each year, on or before September 15, each chapter shall provide copies of its chapter yearbook to the State Officers, the Director of its District and the State Chairman of the Membership Committee.

Number 14. The State Regent, State Vice Regent, and Historian shall have the custody of the Kansas Society DAR Archives, which is located in the Kansas DAR Library in Dodge City, Kansas, and shall at the end of their term give a list of the contents of the file to the incoming Regent, to the Vice Regent, and to the Historian. No one shall have the key without the permission of these three officers.

Number 15. The State Regent may send a report of the October National Board Meeting to each chapter of the Kansas Society.

Number 16. The State Regent's Pin and jeweled insignia shall be self-insured for replacement cost by the State Society.

Number 17. The Kansas DAR Library shall be located in the lower level of the Village Square Mall, 2601 Central Avenue, in Dodge City, Kansas.

- (a) The Kansas Society DAR shall have the responsibility and jurisdiction over the maintenance, insurance, loan and period of housing at the Village Square Mall.
- (b) The Dodge City Chapter DAR shall provide a committee that shall be known as the Dodge City Chapter Kansas DAR Library Committee to assume care of

the library. The committee shall keep the State Librarian informed of the condition and status of books, materials and equipment; shall assist the State Librarian when possible in the repair and maintenance of these items; and shall receive and answer all requests for the loan of books and other material.

- (c) Annually by January 1, \$300 shall be paid for Kansas DAR Library location expenses.
- (d) Materials submitted to the Kansas DAR Library shall be limited to items of genealogical nature. To avoid duplication, donors shall check with the State Librarian before books are sent.

Number 18. An Endowment Fund for the support of the Kansas DAR Library has been established in order to ensure its future.

- (a) Monies contributed to the Endowment Fund shall be under the jurisdiction of the State Treasurer.
- (b) The annual interest accrued from the fund shall pay for the following annual library expenses: rent, insurance, operating expenses, and purchase and maintenance of equipment.

Number 19. A Library Endowment Fund II shall be established for the purpose of expenses connected with the Kansas DAR Library facilities and hired staff; the earned interest of the Library Endowment Fund II Certificate of Deposit shall be added to the principle and shall remain in the Certificate of Deposit until needed.

Number 20. A Kansas DAR Scholarship shall be awarded annually to a high school senior who has DAR eligibility or to a member of DAR; proof of enrollment in a two or four-year accredited college or university shall be required.

Number 21. In the event that no applications are received for the scholarships offered during any year of the term, applications will be accepted for those scholarships the following year in addition to those regularly scheduled to be awarded.

Number 22. At the Conference Opening, the State Regent shall appoint a committee to approve the minutes of the State Conference.

Number 23. The hospitality of the following persons, if attending the State Conference at the official invitation of the State Regent, shall be a conference expense: Candidates for the office of President General, NSDAR; National Executive Officers or National Appointees appearing as speakers; two members of the National Board of Management; representatives of the DAR Schools, Approved Schools, and Indian Schools; or any designated speaker for a special program or event.

- **Number 24.** The Registration Fee shall be waived for members serving as State Conference Pages.
- **Number 25.** (a) A \$10 limit shall be placed on awards at State Conference given by each committee chairman or state officer.
- (b) Interest accrued annually from the Mary Lempenau Permanent Trust of \$750 shall pay monetary awards at State Conference.
- **Number 26.** The Kansas State Outstanding Junior shall be awarded \$150 if she attends Continental Congress, to be paid from the general fund.
- **Number 27.** Each national winner sponsored by a Kansas chapter who attends Continental Congress to receive their award shall be reimbursed \$250.00 for transportation expenses. The reimbursement shall be from the General Fund.
- **Number 28.** The Kansas Society shall present to the State Regent an Ex-State Regent's Pin or, if she has been elected Honorary State Regent, an Honorary State Regent's Pin at the end of her term of office, providing that she has served two-thirds of her elected term. Shall be ordered by the State Treasurer and presented by the State Vice Regent.
- **Number 29.** An Honorary State Regent who becomes a candidate for national office shall be extended the courtesy of one full-page, black-and-white advertisement in the *DAR Magazine*; donations from Districts, chapters, and individuals may be solicited, but the Kansas Society shall be responsible for any remaining balance of the expense of the advertisement to be paid from the general fund. The candidate shall be responsible for, and bear the expense of, the preparation of the advertisement for publication.
- **Number 30.** The plans for the State September Meeting shall be made by March 1, by the State Regent and State Vice Regent, in consultation with the host District Director.
- **Number 31.** The facility and other expenses of the Kansas Society's State September Meeting shall be allotted from the General Fund.
- **Number 32.** A pilgrimage to a historically significant Kansas site may be held annually. Local chapters may act as hostesses. A sum not to exceed fifty dollars shall be allotted to the committee in charge of the pilgrimage.
- **Number 33.** A State Press Book Chairman shall be appointed by the State Regent, such Chairman to receive all publicity from the chapters and to prepare a State Press Book and/or a State Scrapbook. The book shall be given to each State Regent under whose administration it is compiled.

Number 34. An updated list of past State Officers, KSDAR holdings and other pertinent historical information shall be published in the Annual Report and Proceedings at the end of every third administration starting in 2001.

Number 36. The chapters of the host district for State Conference shall contribute an amount, set by the Executive Committee, not to exceed \$15.00. These monies are to be paid to the State Treasurer, to be used for decorations, table favors, hospitality and/or door prizes at the Annual State Conference. Surplus funds will be sent to the State General Fund.

Number 37. At any State Conference these rules may be adopted or suspended by a majority vote and may be amended by a majority vote with notice, or a two-thirds vote without notice.

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
