UPDATES FROM CONTINENTAL CONGRESS

The 128th Continental Congress brought many changes to the National Society and KSDAR. The new VanBuren *Rise and Shine Administration* is bringing many exciting new things to DAR. A few of the highlights from Congress include:

- The Congress voted to bring the Insignia sales in-house.
- The Congress voted to raise National dues by \$2, increasing the total to \$42.
- NSDAR unveiled a refreshed logo for the organization.
- The Congress voted to increase the cost of Life Membership to \$1,200.
- The Congress elected the VanBuren Administration, Denise VanBuren, President General, and Kansas Honorary State Regent, Kathryn West, as Corresponding Secretary General.
- Susan Metzger, Kansas State Regent and Rebecca Kline, Kansas State
 Vice Regent took their oaths of office during the installation ceremony.
- Past Registrar General Mary Frisch was elected as an Honorary Vice President General.

MY NEW HORIZONS EXPERIENCE

I'm a relative newby when it comes to DAR membership – I've been a member for less than 5 years. I took the New Members course and learned quite a bit about my new organization. But instead of answering all of my questions, it just made me thirsty to learn more!

I decided to take the New Horizons Course. After the list of training modules was sent to me, I didn't balk at the over 40 assignments I needed to complete...until I got about a third of the way through. Then, I thought to myself, "this might take at least FOR – EVER to complete!" As with everything – a journey of 1,000 miles (begins with a single step) – the consumption of an elephant (is taken one bite at a time) – the completion of the New Horizon Course is one step, one part of a module at a time.

I listed all the courses on an Excel spreadsheet so I could keep track of my progress. I had columns for the date I completed the module, the date I submitted the module and any note that I might have regarding the module ("you need to write an essay to complete this!") All in all, that method worked pretty well for me – if you want to use that for your experience.

As I waded through the modules, spending more time digging deeper on some subjects compared to others, I grew to appreciate this organization more and more.

There is something for everyone. The topics are so wide and varied that anyone can find not only an interest but a passion! This organization has so many facets that you could be an extrovert, an introvert, the team captain, a team member, a team equipment manager and still find the perfect spot here.

Make no mistake – there is a LOT to learn, but each module, each section is crucial to the organization. You don't have to be responsible for doing each aspect in your chapter, but the modules give you an excellent idea on how big this organization is and how many people each doing a piece of it, make it run so efficiently. Before you start on your "little piece" – get a good look at the big picture and see how it all fits together. And how each piece is an important component. Take that step – start the New Horizons Course. You'll be so glad you did!

STATE APPLICATION TEAM AND THE PMD

The Prospective Member Database (PMD) in e-Membership is a valuable tool for chapters as it is where NSDAR places the names of those that have contacted them and expressed interest in joining DAR. In many instances, chapters and their registrars struggle to give these prospective members (PMs) attention as they are busy working on papers for "home-grown" PMs that have come through acquaintances, relatives and other known entities. The Kansas Society is taking a new approach to assist chapters with this group of PMs as well as to assist the PMs themselves.

NSDAR will now contact the State Application Team (SAT) with the PMs names and information, preference for location and time/date of meetings, as well as any other information that is provided. The SAT will assign the PM to two different chapters that meet their needs. The SAT will then begin working on the PM's papers instead of the chapter registrar, while the two chapters contact the PM and invite her to meetings. Once the papers are completed by the SAT members, the PM then chooses which chapter she would like to join; then the completed DAR Application is provided to that Chapter for signatures and mailing to NSDAR with the applicable fees.

It will be important for the assigned chapters to make early contact with those placed on the PMD as that will be monitored and if there is no or late contact, that chapter will be removed, and a new chapter added. The SAT will work in coordination with the State Volunteer Genealogists and the State Lineage Research Committee to complete the applications, and if needed the America 250! Task Force will be asked for assistance. It is the goal of the SAT to ease some of the workload of the chapter registrars while assisting PMs with becoming members in a much-streamlined approach.

The Chair of the SAT is Marla Ainsworth, who is assisted by committee members Jan Wichman, Phyllis Benedict, and Pat Carpenter. Marla is happy to answer any questions that you may have and is hopeful that the SAT will be of great assistance to the chapters as well as KSDAR.



THE CHAPTER MASTER REPORT IS NOW AVAILABLE

The 2019 Chapter Master Report (CMR) is now available on the Member's Website at http://members.dar.org/CMR.

The CMR illustrates the health of your chapter and provides information for KSDAR and NSDAR to show what a dynamic service organization we are.

The CMR is a valuable tool to use when planning your Chapter's programs and activities for the year. It can provide chapter chairs with information that they should be focusing on for their committees and what information will be needed.

It is never to early to start filling in the blanks on the CMR. It must be completed no later than February 1, 2020.
