What a great day we had for a special DAR Day of Service Project. After receiving all the required information from 41 Chapters, our Guinness application has been sent in. Regardless of how many total blankets were made, this project was a success. Veterans across the state of Kansas will benefit from our love and hard work – they will know that Kansas Daughters care about them and are forever thankful for their service.

On October 10, 2020, 390 volunteers across the state created blankets in groups or individually. Forty-one chapters participated with a total of 1,625 service hours spent on this project. We did not hit our goal or set the record, but the 722 blankets made will benefit many in our communities, providing comfort and warmth. Though we did not meet our goal of 2,020 blankets, the day was still a success.



Each chapter is encouraged to submit their participation in the new DAR Day of Service award. The information can be found on the DAR website. The state with the most submissions will be recognized, and with 41 out of 62 chapters participating, that is an amazing number! Each coordinator should also send their information to the Chapter Regent to be included in your Chapter Master Report. Service Opportunity at Haskell

As this year has hit many of us like a freight train, this chair has tried to remain positive and tenacious in pursuit of trying to find ways for Kansas Daughters to continue their support to Haskell Indians Nations University.

While the Haskell campus remains shut down, many students have begun to return to Lawrence for support both emotionally and academically. According to Manny King, Haskell Student Life Director, students have found it increasingly difficult to study remotely without the accountability and support of other students and faculty.

Approximately 50 students are now back in Lawrence and they have been reaching out for assistance. Since we are unable to provide physical supplies at this time, Manny discussed providing Wal-Mart gift cards to those students living off-campus in Lawrence. Given the holidays and winter are right around the corner, I would like to provide Haskell students with at least 50 gift cards (\$30 denomination each). If we collect more than are needed for those students living in Lawrence right now, Manny plans to mail any extras to those students most in need who are still at home on the reservation or back in their home communities.

2021 State Conference Credentials

The 2021 State Conference is a mere six months away (April 22 – 24 in Lawrence, KS) and credentials for each chapter are due to the State Credentials Chair, State Registrar and the State Treasurer by March 8, 2021. For your chapter to have eligible voting delegates representing the chapter at State Conference, the chapter must have paid its dues by December 1, 2020, and have elected their delegates by February 21, 2021. Each chapter is allowed delegates and alternates based upon the size of the chapter: a chapter with 12 – 49 members has three votes (regent plus two); and a chapter with 50 – 199 members has six votes (regent plus five). The number of alternates shall not exceed twice the number of delegates. To represent a chapter as a delegate, a chapter member must have been a member of the chapter for at least a year.

The credentials form must be completed and submitted by the deadline – delegates will not be allowed to vote if the credentials are received late. The form can be found on the KSDAR members website, SIP tab under State Committees – Credentials. Additional information on the 2021 State Conference will be available after the first of the year.



DAR Service for Veterans Awards

Do you know an outstanding volunteer in your community or your chapter? DAR Service for Veterans has three award categories to consider.

- **Outstanding Veteran Volunteer Award** - presented to a veteran in recognition of outstanding achievement in personal, professional, and family life. Applicant must prove significant contributions of leadership, patriotism, and increased public awareness of veterans. The sponsoring chapter must be in the state where the veteran lives.
- **Outstanding Youth Volunteer Award** - presented to a youth volunteer who provides service for veterans and is 14 to 21 years of age. The award is given in recognition of outstanding or unusual care given to veterans. The candidate for the award serves as a role model for peers and consistently demonstrates the qualities of leadership.
- **Outstanding DAR Service for Veterans Award** - presented to a DAR member in recognition of outstanding care given to veterans in any of the following areas: Department of Veterans Affairs facilities, state veterans facilities, nursing homes, shelters, and outpatient clinics. The outstanding NSDAR volunteer has given more than her time. She has made meaningful contributions to veterans through creative and resourceful outreach.

The DAR Service for Veterans State and National Award Winners may now be presented medals for their awards along with certificates. Please contact the DAR Store to purchase the medals. These medals are available to State and National award recipients that have received the DAR Service for Veterans Awards.



Protocol 101 – Proper Care of Pins

Many of us proudly wear our pins every opportunity we have, and as members of DAR, we understand not only the monetary value of the pins and insignia, but also the significance of these.

But once we can no longer wear our ribbon, do our family members and friends know what we want done with our pins? Ensure that your pins do not end up on online auction sites or estate sales by completing the NSDAR Form for Dispensation of Insignia. This document allows Daughters to determine who should receive your pins and any special instructions. Keep this completed form with your important papers so that your wishes can be followed. It is also important to take photographs of your pins to include with the form and to have for insurance purposes.

The form can be found on the KSDAR members website under the SIP tab, under Insignia.

Dues are Due!

All dues are due to KSDAR and NSDAR postmarked by December 1, 2020. If you have not yet paid your dues, please remit to your chapter treasurer as soon as possible to keep from being dropped by NSDAR. Chapters should consider paying the national dues of their members through the online transfer system – it only costs a one-time fee of 50 cents to set up, and chapters utilizing the system will be awarded points on the Chapter Achievement Awards.

Do you need some tax benefits for 2020? Now is the time to make donations to one or more of the national society's many funds – you can adopt a seat in Constitution Hall, support the Friends of DAR Schools or many other areas depending on your areas of interest. Consider becoming a Sustaining Supporter to make monthly donations! Donations to KSDAR also count and there are several different funds available including the Kansas Chapel, State Regent's Project, Markers and Archives as well as scholarships. 
KSDAR State Treasurer Janet Lake has asked chapters to consider remitting their required and voluntary donations early this year as NSDAR has changed their due date leaving few days to send the contributions to National. To ensure that your chapter is credited, remember you must use the remittance form that is found under the State Treasurer on the SIP tab of the KSDAR members website. The State Treasurer is available to assist chapters with any questions that they may have concerning dues and KSDAR and NSDAR donations.

Chapter Master Report

The Chapter Master Report (CMR) is an NSDAR Document that every chapter is required to complete by February 1, 2021. This report is a snapshot of each chapter's activities during 2020 and allows KSDAR and NSDAR to award success stories from each chapter. To access the CMR, go to eMembership and select the Updates button and from the list select Chapter Master Report Admin. There you will see the Pin Access Code that can be shared with your chapter's officers and chairs. If those members don't have an eMembership password, they can email the Organizing Secretary General's office at organizing@dar.org.

Remember that you can't break the CMR. You can add and change the information you provide until February 1, 2021. Go through the chapter's minutes for all of 2020, look at programs and chapter activities. Survey your members to see what activities that they participated in during the year in the different committees. Remember to call out members by their names and to give expanded descriptions of the activities. If your chapter has not started the CMR, you will want to do so immediately as it takes some time to complete.

Many chapters have asked why we are required to complete this document, and there are several reasons. One purpose is to have a marker of a chapter's health. If there has been little activity and the total point level is low, it will alert the State Regent so that she can assist the chapter with any issues that it might be having. Another reason is to be able showcase chapter projects that are outstanding and/or unique, and to reward chapters and individuals who have done an exceptional job. If anyone has questions or needs assistance with the CMR, reach out to one of the KSDAR State Officers as they are experienced with this document and available to assist.






Commemorative Events – Mayflower Compact

The 400th Anniversary of the Mayflower Compact, which occurs this month, is one of the events that President General Denise VanBuren has asked us to commemorate during her administration. Due to adverse weather conditions, the Mayflower landed at Cape Cod rather than Northern Virginia, which is where the contract had specified. The people onboard who were not Pilgrims felt that this breach of contract meant that they were not bound by obeying any laws made by Pilgrims, and they threatened to revolt. The Mayflower Compact was a social contract in which the signers agreed to abide by just and equal laws that would be for the good of the whole company "saints (Pilgrims) and sinners (all others)" alike. It also agreed to continue their allegiance to the king. The contract is important as it could be considered as a precursor to the democratic principles found in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution.

Annual Report & Proceedings (AR&P) and Certificates


