Keynote Speaker, Ruth Robinson Society of the Honor Guard, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier *Friday, April 23, 2021, 4:00 p.m. - Zoom*



If you have ever wondered what life is like for those few that qualify to be members of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier Honor Guard, you will enjoy listening to the KSDAR State Conference Keynote Speaker Ruth Robinson.

Ruth Robinson is a native of Waco, Texas. She graduated from Birmingham-Southern College in



2010 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology where she was a star soccer goalie. She joined the U.S. Army in October 2011 as a Military Police Soldier. Her first duty station was Fort Carson, Colorado serving with the 59th and 984th Military Police Companies. In 2013 she deployed to Afghanistan. It was after being deployed to Afghanistan in 2013 that she began researching the Old Guard, its specialty platoons and the Tomb of the Unknowns. "I also happened to run into an old Tomb Guard Identification Badge holder and talked to him a little bit," Robinson said. "That kind of se- in stone what I wanted to try to do during my next assignment."

Her next duty station was Fort Myer, VA in 2015 serving in the 289th Military Police Company. In June 2015 she volunteered for training at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. She completed the training, earning badge number 643 and was promoted to Staff Sergeant and Commander of the Relief in September 2016 and was the fourth female guard. Since 1948, Soldiers of the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment "The Old Guard" have served in the distinguished duty as sentinels, guarding the tomb in any kind of weather, 24 hours a day and 365 days a year. The Guard is changed every 30 minutes from April 1 to Sep. 30 and every hour from Oct. 1 to March 31. During the hours the cemetery is closed, the guard is changed every 2 hours.

Sentinels are considered to be the best of the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment, which is headquartered at Joint Base Myer-Henderson Hall, Virginia. Each Soldier must be in superb physical condition and have an unblemished military record. An interview and a two-week trial determine the Soldier's capability to train as a tomb guard. Once chosen, he or she will undergo many hours of intensive training and testing, which focuses on overall performance, uniform preparation and knowledge of the tomb and Arlington National Cemetery.

Women must meet the same requirements as male Soldiers to be eligible as tomb guards. The only difference is that women have a lower minimum height requirement. Male sentinels must be between 5 feet 10 inches and 6 feet 4 inches tall. "I did not get treated any differently," Robinson said. "The crowd might have more of a response because there is a female there, but when it comes to work and training, it's absolutely the same."

She served in this role until her Expiration of Term of Service (ETS) from active duty in March 2018. Ruth joined the National Guard where she earned a commission as a 2nd Lieutenant. She has since transferred to the Army Reserve where she now serves as a Platoon Leader in the 800th Military Police Company. In May 2020, she earned her Master of Science in Conservation Biology. Ruth currently serves as the Education Committee Chairwoman for the Society of the Honor Guard, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. She is married to her husband of almost 3 years, Brad Robinson, Lieutenant Commander (LCDR), U.S. Navy.

Eunice Sterling Chapter Celebrates American Heritage Winner

Her entry was an all-cloth doll replica of Anna Metzger, wife of Patriot Frederick Metzger, a Revolutionary War Patriot. She was historically dressed for the early 1780's with ten layers of clothing including a chemise, corset, under petticoat, bum roll, pockets, stomacher, scarf, over skirt, jacket and bonnet.

The Judging Criteria for the Doll Category was as follows: 30 points for workmanship & construction of body, face, and hair; 25 points for the workmanship and construction of the clothing and its appropriateness to the period; 25 points for originality of overall design and incorporation of the theme. Karen will be recognized at the Awards Night Ceremony of the 130th Continental Congress on June 25, Congratulations Karen! Eunice Sterling is proud!



Chaplain's Corner

As spring has "sprung", and the flowers begin to bloom, my thoughts turn to New Life, which in turn leads me to think of those who have gone before us that will bloom in heaven. This is the time of year that the State Chaplain plans the Memorial Service. As our State Conference is a hybrid format this year, the "spring" KSDAR Memorial Service will be later in the year. The Necrology Report will reflect those members who passed from April 1, 2020 to March 31, 2021. These names come directly from eMembership, which reflects the Chapters' timely reporting to National the death of a member. That is why it is very important to report member deaths via eMembership. It is ALSO important to fill out and send the next of kin form located on the KSDAR members only website to the State Chaplain so that she can extend sympathies on behalf of the State Officers.

This form, along with the 90+ Birthday form for members in your Chapter, are very important. It is always nice to receive birthday greetings!

The Chaplain General said about 90+ Birthday greetings: "I send an average of 50 cards a month to those celebrating 90, 100, and 100+ so I assume that most chapters have members in their 90s. Having said that, I am also pretty sure that I am not hearing from anywhere near all the chapters who could be sending birthday greetings." Please send requests for 90, 100 and 100+ birthday greetings from the Chaplain General - your members will be so pleased to receive them.

Questions on the Chaplain page of the CMR have arisen, to which the Chaplain General responded:

"The question regarding sending birthday greetings to 90+ members has been on the CMR for many years because the Chaplain General has a focus on sending greetings to members 90 years old and above and encourages state and chapter chaplains to send cards to those 91-99. This information is to help the Chaplain General with her own reporting. I would suggest if the chapter has no 90+ members the chapter chaplain put a NA in the place and put a sentence in the box about the cards they do send to their Daughters."

"The question regarding how many Memorial Services did you chapter conduct in the year could be answered by "Three members died this year and we had a memorial service for them in June, or "We had no members decease this year therefore the answer is zero." Filling out this form is not a contest for points. It is to help the Chaplain General get a feeling for what events the chapters are participating in and do her own reporting.

Desire Tobey Sears Exemplifies Americanism

The Desire Tobey Sears Chapter proved that the pandemic could not slow them down from honoring America - the chapter set themselves apart with all their community activities.

Sherry Koster had Flag cards made then sent cards to 50 Veterans in the Jewell County area that were living in assisted living situations. The cards were colorful renditions of various versions of Old Glory.

The Chapter raises 200 American flags around the Courthouse square in Belleville, Kansas for all Flag Code Days. The chapter was a part of the original Patriot Project that raised the money for the flags for the community. These flags have plaques on them that honor service members. Many members of the chapter and their HODAR's participate in this project.

The Blecha family places 104 flags on every Veteran's grave in the Tabor Cemetery in rural Munden on Memorial Day and takes them down at dusk. The family has kept the records of Veterans interred there since 1970.

The KSDAR Americanism Chair Kristi Kocher highlighted the Desire Tobey Sears Chapter in her report for State Conference as a chapter that showed that our chapters were able to continue their important work even during a global pandemic.

Iwa Jima 76th Anniversary Program

This year marks the 76th anniversary of the Battle of Iwo Jima. The Battle of Iwo Jima was an epic military campaign between U.S. Marines and the Imperial Army of Japan in early 1945. Located 750 miles off the coast of Japan, the island of Iwo Jima had three airfields that could serve as a staging facility for a potential invasion of mainland Japan. American forces invaded the island on February 19, 1945, and the ensuing Battle of Iwo Jima lasted for five weeks. In some of the bloodiest fighting of World War II, it's believed that all but 200 or so of the 21,000 Japanese forces on the island were killed, as were almost 7,000 Marines.

Jerry Ingram, a WWII Marine, is one of two of the last local survivors of the battle. On March 18, 2021 at the American Legion Post 370 in Overland Park, KS, Friends in Service to Heroes (FISH) continued Mr. Ingram's tradition of honoring the 4th Marine Division that fought in the battle. Mr. Ingram is the president of the Chapter 39 of the 4th Marine Division Association of WWII and was in attendance at the event.

Lieutenant General Emil Bedard, retired USMC, who served as Deputy Commander for Plans Policies and Operations provided the historical perspective of this pivotal battle. Also speaking was Iwo Jima Medal of Honor recipient, "Woody" Williams.

DAR members, Pam Kelley, John & Hattie Possum, Cindy St. John, Quivira Crossing, Laura Kaiser, Shawnee Mission Chapter, Janet Alley, Sagamore Chapter were proud to attend the very moving ceremony to honor these heroes. It was a memorable evening for all who attended.





Topeka Chapter Celebrates 125th Anniversary at Tree Planting

The Topeka Chapter Celebrated 125 Years of Service to God, Home and Country by planting a red oak on the campus of Washburn University on Friday, April 2, 2021. The Chapter has planted a tree on the campus every year since 1966 after a devastating tornado destroyed most of the trees at Washburn and damaged or destroyed most of the campus buildings.

The chapter was joined at the celebration by State Regent Susan Metzger and University president Dr. Jerry Farley. In addition, four state officers participated in the ceremony. State Organizing Secretary and past KSDAR Chaplain Denise Bullock shared thoughtful words of prayer with the assembled group. State Regent Metzger reminded everyone that KSDAR did not come into being until the Topeka Chapter was organized, thus both share the same anniversary date.

Dr. Farley expressed his appreciation to the Topeka Chapter for their continued support of the University. Chapter Regent Becky Spaulding shared that the 55 years of planting would continue well into the future as the chapter is committed to continue their support.



Save the Date – 125th Anniversary Service Project at Nicodemus

As part of the KSDAR 125th Anniversary celebration, Kansas Daughters will gather on the weekend of August 14-15, 2021 in Nicodemus, KS to perform various projects to assist the National Park Service at this historic site.

Located off U.S. Hwy 24 in Graham County, the site has been administered by the National Park Service since 1996 with a mission to preserve, protect and interpret the only remaining western town established by African Americans during the Reconstruction Period following the American Civil War. There are five historic buildings situated on the 161-acre park, although some are located on private property. The Township Hall, pictured here, serves as the site's Visitor's Center. Nicodemus is home to a few residents.

This service project is still in its initial planning phase and more information, such as lodging options, will be forthcoming. Possible projects suggested by the site superintendent involve painting, cleaning, and organizing, but other opportunities for improvement may later be identified.

It is hoped that by August, the COVID situation will be improve and more Daughters will have been immunized.

Protocol 101 - Reading the Sashes

Each sash worn by the Daughter designates a specific office: active, honorary or past. We can read a sash to determine if the wearer is a member of the National Board of Management, a voter at Continental Congress by virtue of office or a past member of the National Board of Management.

There are four different widths for a sash. The President General's sash is the widest, 5 inches. The remaining eleven executive officers wear 3 1/2 inch wide sashes. The sash worn by each of the 21 Vice Presidents General measures 2 1/2 inches in width. And, the sash of a State Regent is 1 1/4 inches wide. The sash worn by the State Regent is the same as the ribbon on which the DAR pins are worn.

All widths of the sash which are solid blue with the white border are worn by members of the National Board of Management who are also, by virtue of office, voters at Continental Congress. These Daughters are not issued voter badges for Continental Congress as their sashes indicate they are voters.

Those who wear a solid white sash bordered in blue are honorary officers who have been elected for life. There are two widths of these. One who has served as President General and is elected an Honorary President General by Continental Congress. Her sash is the same width as that of the President General. Honorary Vice Presidents General number thirteen. These Daughters have served as Vice President General and are elected by Continental Congress to serve as Honorary Vice President General. Such honorary officers wear solid white sashes bordered in blue, in the same width as the sash worn by a Vice President General. Those who wear one of these two sashes are voters at Continental Congress and are not issued separate voter badges.

There are three widths of sashes which designate past officers who have served on the National Board of Management. Two of these sashes indicate past national office, either Executive or Vice President General. They are the same width and color as those worn when serving actively and designate past term by the addition of two narrow stripes of white through the middle field of blue. Such sashes do not indicate the wearers as voters at Continental Congress. To be a voter at Continental Congress the wearer of such a sash would need to be elected by her chapter as delegate or as an alternate who is taking the place of an absent delegate, and she would wear a voter's badge. The third sash is worn by an Honorary State Regent. This sash, the same width as that of the State Regent, is white to indicate "honorary" as she was elected by her State Conference as an Honorary State Regent. The colors are reversed, and through the center field of white is a narrow blue stripe which indicates a past office. Like that of other past members of the National Board of Management, the wearer of this sash is entitled to a voter's badge only if elected by her chapter as a chapter representative.

In summary, a solid center field of blue or white indicates a voter at Continental Congress; blue is for active office and white designates honorary office. Stripes through the center field of blue or white indicate past office which does not designate wearer as a voter at Continental Congress.

Although some Daughters may be eligible for more than one sash, they wear only the one which represents an active or honorary office or the highest office held.
