Metzger Administration Welcome ^{Pg. 2} Home Grants

The Metzger Administration will once again be awarding "Welcome Home" Grants in 2021. Chapters may apply for grant funds that support projects that Welcome Home our Nation's veterans and current service members – whether a physical home or the home that is created through healing and purpose. Additionally, chapters may sponsor an organization applying for grant funds that directly support veterans and current service members.

These grants to benefit veterans and current service members are only available because of the generous support of Kansas Daughters to the State Regent's Project. The Grant application deadline is March 15, 2021. Chapters and chapters sponsoring organizations receiving grants for projects will be notified by April 15, 2020. Grants in amounts between \$500 and \$2500 will be awarded. The Grant Application and the Grant Application Instruction Sheet can be found on the KSDAR members' website. Questions regarding KSDAR "Welcome Home" Grants may be directed to Kathryn West at kawest122@gmail.com.

Last year's grant recipient was the Flores del Sol Chapter who received a \$2,500 grant for the Robert J. Dole VA to assist Wichita homeless Veterans to move into permanent housing. With this grant, 10 queen size beds and platform frames were purchased along with 20 pillows and 10 bed in a bag linen sets. Karen Malcolm, a VA Voluntary Service Representative at the Robert J. Dole VA stated, "We are so grateful for this donation, we had four Veterans who moved into housing recently who were waiting on a bed and two more scheduled to move in this week! These items will go fast and were so needed – we cannot end Veteran homelessness without community partners like KSDAR. Thank you!!!!

In the coming months, we will share with you tips to make the Prospective Members Database (PMD) work better for your chapter. Many chapters do not use the PMD. Communication is important for keeping the chapter up to date and the PMD is a great way to communicate with your chapter on prospective members. You can add notes on communications and the SAT Team uses it to communicate what has been done with your prospectives.

When the SAT Team receives a prospect from NSDAR we first look to see where you meet. Each Chapter's location and meeting time is on a map in the PMD, so it is important to keep this updated. It is also a great help when your chapter is chartered in one city but meets in another. To update, log into e-Membership and go to the Updates menu. The Membership Updates menu list shows Chapter Meeting Demographics Edit Screen. The zip code should be for the location you would meet in normal times with the Meeting note showing that you are currently meeting on zoom but would meet at the XXX building when in person meetings resume.

With this information, I send the prospective information about your meeting time. I also use your yearbook so if you didn't send one in September, please know that vital information about your chapter is missing. Of course, if you have any questions about the PMD, I am always available to help.

It's Part of the Adventure

My father was a great explorer. Every Sunday the five of us would pile in the car with a picnic basket filled with goodies and we had the necessities: binoculars, the "Birds of Kansas" and "Kansas Wildflowers" books and a tattered Rand McNally Atlas. We were never disappointed in what we found.

Perhaps this training is why I get so excited about the Santa Fe Trail, especially here in Kansas. We have more miles of the trail than the other four states the trail passes through. Kansas Daughters developed the original program to place markers along the trail, secured funding for the project and executed the plan by purchasing and placing the markers in the correct location. Each marker tells a story of its own.

With this legacy we need to spotlight KSDAR and the 200th Anniversary of the Santa Fe Trail by accepting the following "Adopt a Marker" challenge:

1. Adopt a marker along the trail, located anywhere, and let me know which one your chapter adopts.
2. Plan to put a wreath at the marker, and photograph.
3. Submit an article and photo to your local newspaper. I will prepare a script for those who want it and post it on the Santa Fe Trail Commemorative Event site. Copy me on your submittal.
4. Chapters who participate will receive a Certificate of Award and recognition for your efforts.

This challenge is a great opportunity for chapters to come together and learn the history of the Santa Fe Trail and about the individual markers! This fun activity does not require a lot of manpower, money or being in the proximity of the adopted marker. This project will educate the public about DAR and how Kansas Daughters work to preserve our Kansas history.

Many Kansas chapters are planning projects surrounding the 200th Anniversary of the Santa Fe Trail including rededication ceremonies, chapters researching about the trail and preparing programs and presentations, and there is even a possibility of a quilt contest. Take your chapter on a Santa Fe Trail adventure by participating in the "Adopt a Marker Project" or other activity.

She serves as a member the USD 345 COVID-19 Task Force in which she helped provide guidance for re-opening schools following the COVID-19 outbreak. She has been very active in National History Day, qualifying multiple times for state and national competition. Genealogy Courses for Everyone!

The DAR Genealogy Education Programs are a valuable tool for any genealogist, but in particular for DAR Volunteer Genealogists and Chapter Registrars. The courses are directed towards NSDAR specific standards and provide in depth detail to trace lineages to existing Patriots, or even establish a new Patriot!

GEP I will provide all the basic information needed to begin your ancestry research. The course explains how to identify and evaluate source material, how to best utilize various documents, and which documents may or may not be accepted by the Office of the Registrar General.

GEP II contains all the information you need to complete a new member or supplemental application. This includes lineage research explanations and examples of the different types of service, why proving residency is so important, and how to utilize the GRS system to your advantage. It is a resource rich program and includes many different handouts, such as an application checklist form, standard formats and abbreviations, and the Do's and Don'ts of Page 3. E-applications and Build-an-App are explained in detail as well as how to complete the standard paper applications.

Completing these first two programs will give you the confidence to assist your chapter with lineage research. If you really want to drill down to the hardcore nitty-gritty of DAR genealogy research, however, you should consider taking GEP III. This course provides a wealth of research material covering substitute records, where to look for minority lineage information, how to document and write an analysis, and links to some great residency sources. This is only a small part of GEP III, and of all the courses this is the one you will repeatedly return to for help with stubborn research questions.

This leads me to note you get a complete transcription of each of these courses which you can download and save/print for your future reference, including all the handouts and images contained in the courses. This is very handy for reviewing before taking the course quizzes! And don't be put off by the idea of tests; you have multiple opportunities to re-take a quiz if you don't pass the first time around, there is no penalty, and they explain what you missed and what the correct answer should have been.

I would highly recommend the Genealogy Education Programs to any member wanting to improve their research skills. The time allotted to complete a program is 90 days, which is more than sufficient, and the course presentations are easy to follow and well thought out. 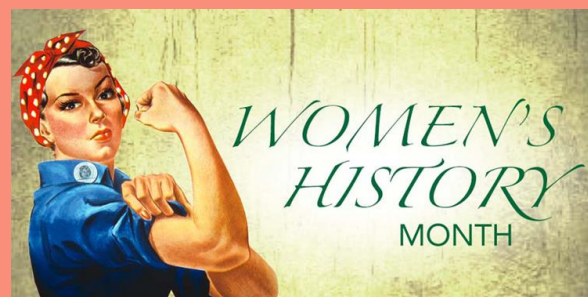

Protocol 101 – Pins and Sashes

If a member is invited to represent her chapter or the state at another organization, pins and sashes would be appropriate. Pins may be worn with dress slacks or pant suits; this does not include jeans or casual pants. Sashes are not worn with any type of pants. Insignia, pins and ribbons are not to be worn in public unless one is officially representing the DAR. Insignia, pins and ribbon may be worn during the dedication of a grave marker for a deceased Daughter and also at the funeral, viewing or memorial service of a Daughter.

In accordance with the DAR Handbook, Chapter XII, The Official Sash, "The DAR sash is not to be worn while attending a function of another organization unless the member is attending in her official DAR capacity."

Continental Congress - State Plaza Hotel

Are you planning to go to Continental Congress? A KSDAR block of rooms has been reserved at the State Plaza Hotel, six blocks from DAR Headquarters.
